W. Vanderbilt Made Public.

York, March 16.—The will of W. Vanderbilt, as filed here last Thursday, leaves the estate, estimated at \$30,000,000, to his widow and his only child, Cornelia.

Mr. Vanderbilt's world-wide estate in North Carolina, is his daughter, Cornelia, who is 70 years old. She also receives \$100,000 in cash and is made regent.

Vanderbilt, the widow, received the estate at Bar Harbor. The Vanderbilt house in Washington, valued at \$250,000 in cash, a life interest in a trust fund of \$1,000,000, she may dispose of at her pleasure, and part of the estate in North Carolina known as the Forset, containing about 10,000 acres, together with the control of timber therefrom, to produce about \$50,000 a year, is bequeathed to Mrs. Vanderbilt in trust of a dowry.

Va., March 16.—While attempting to save the life of Miss Dixie Blackburn, his sweetheart, whose foot was caught in a railway trestle near here last Thursday, William McCoy was struck by a train and tossed into the ravine fifty feet away. The girl was instantly killed and McCoy was dying when picked up by the train crew.

Mr. Preston W. Campbell, of Abingdon, and Miss Louise E., daughter of Mr. and Mrs. V. E. Howard, of Roanoke, will be married at the home of the bride's parents on the evening of April 11th.

The commission of Bristol, Tenn., last week adopted an ordinance to protect her home merchants from the operation of "traveling merchants," or peddlers. The new ordinance fixes a tax of \$10 for the first day and \$5 for each succeeding day upon peddlers of merchandise. The Bristol, Va., authorities are expected to adopt similar legislation.

Body of J. W. Harris is Exhumed.

Bristol, Va., March 16.—Suspicious of the report that J. W. Harris, a former Virginian and prominent as a horseman, had committed suicide in St. Louis January 5, was a fake, his creditors secured a permit to exhume the body. The grave was opened in St. Louis last Friday and the body was positively identified as that of Harris. A Chicago woman, claiming to be Harris's widow, was here recently seeking possession of Harris's farm and other property in Washington County, Va., valued at \$30,000.

104 Years Old, Never Had a Doctor.

Syracuse, N. Y., March 16.—Samuel Keefer celebrated his one hundred and fourth birthday last Wednesday at his home in the town of Torrey, by sawing nearly half a cord of wood. He is the oldest living graduate of Albany Normal College, and at one time was principal of an academy in New Jersey.

Among his pupils was a boy who afterwards became Lieutenant Harry Daines, Jefferson Davis' jailer while he was detained on a charge of high treason at Fortress Monroe.

He attributes his long life to the fact that he has ever kept away from doctors, never needlessly exposed himself and always observed simple rules of hygienic living. Believes Slempp Will Go Back to Congress.

"The Republicans of the Ninth District will hold a convention in the city of Bristol, when a congressman will be nominated, and I expect to see Congressman Slempp named to succeed himself," said former Senator John C. Noell, of Lee county, who is in the city on private business.

"I know that Mr. Slempp prefers to retire from politics, but he will take the nomination, I believe, when it is made plain to him that he is the man whom the majority of the people want in Congress. He has often made the race, and every time he has won. I think he will be the nominee."—Exchange.

N. W. Bowe, Prominent Business Man of Richmond, Dead.

N. W. Bowe, seventy-one years old, a widely-known citizen and one of Richmond's leading real estate brokers, died suddenly Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock at his home, 917 West Franklin Street, Richmond. Death was due to heart trouble, and he expired in less than five minutes after he had been stricken. He had been out riding and had just returned to his home and suddenly complained of an acute pain in his head. While he was being massaged with a view to relieving the pain he expired. Mr. Bowe was a brother to Mrs. A. M. Venable of Marion who has the sympathy of many friends in her bereavement.

Rev. L. S. G. Miller, missionary to Japan, will preach the sermon to the missionary society Sunday night.

Death of Dr. Alexander S. Haller.

Wytheville, Va., March 16.—Dr. Alexander S. Haller, many years a prominent druggist here, died at his home in the East End at 12 o'clock last Wednesday night, after a protracted illness. He was about eighty years old. Besides being prominent in business here, he was many years an elder in the Presbyterian church and was universally admired and respected.

They expressed themselves as much pleased with the church and the economy with which the results have been attained. The Chilhowie Methodists started out to repair their old church and put in a heating plant, new seats, etc., but have now reached the point where they are talking of a new \$10,000 church. It was to see what Glade Spring had accomplished along this line that the committee was appointed to visit this place.—Glade Spring Vidette.

\$14,000 for Lawyers in the Allen Cases.

As recommended by the Finance Committee, the House Friday afternoon, by a vote of 56 to 20, appropriated \$14,000 for four of the lawyers who prosecuted the Allens. The bill had been passed by the Senate.

The money is to be paid as follows: J. C. Wisor, \$4,000; J. S. Draper, \$4,000; W. S. Poage, \$4,000; S. Floyd Landreth, \$2,000.

Delegate Love, of Lunenburg, opposed the payment because he did not believe, he said, in paying the people's money for the conviction of Claude Allen, who so many believe to have been illegally convicted and unjustly executed.

Lindsay Gordon opposed the bill because he did not believe in establishing the precedent of "putting the treasury of Virginia behind the prosecution of any man the Governor wants prosecuted."

Washington, March 16.—Congressman Carter Glass intends to recommend the appointment of G. A. Sullivan as postmaster at East Radford to succeed Postmaster Howard T. Jenkins, who died on last Thursday of congestion of the lungs. Although the term of Postmaster Jenkins would not regularly have expired for about a year, Mr. Glass decided some time ago to appoint Mr. Sullivan when the time came. Mr. Glass will not make his recommendation until he is notified by the department that the vacancy exists.

Mr. Sullivan was long a resident of Marion where he is well known. His friends here will be pleased to learn of his preferment.

Death of Mr. Charles L. Price.

Mr. Charles L. Price, the well known proprietor of the Commercial House at Ivanhoe, passed away Monday afternoon at six o'clock after suffering the second stroke of paralysis. Mr. Price had been on the sick list for over a week and on Sunday was paralyzed and the second stroke followed the next day as stated above.

The deceased was sixty-six years of age and was born and reared in Giles county, Virginia. He was a loyal Confederate soldier, being a member of the Thirty-sixth Virginia Infantry. He married a Miss Mitchell of Wythe county, who preceded him to the grave.

Boy of Ten Hangs Himself on a Tree.

Bristol, Tenn., March 17.—Worried because his mother left him to care for a younger child while she was out calling, Otis Smith, ten years old, son of Lawson Smith, of Fish Springs, Tenn., committed suicide by hanging from an apple tree.

The lad's mother was prostrated when she found his suspended body.

A mortgage for \$550,346, given by the Virginia and Southwestern Railway in favor of the Guaranty Trust Company, of New York, for cash to purchase new rolling stock, was recorded in Bristol, Va., last week. The money is being used for the purchase of new engines of the Mikado type, and for steel coal cars.

Big Raid in Franklin.

Eleven illicit distilleries, including five copper stills, destroyed and thousands of gallons of beer and wine spilled, besides a quantity of other moonshining paraphernalia cut in four days work in Franklin county is the record of Deputy Collectors of Roanoke last week.

On Wednesday they found a 77 gallon still, six fermenters and 600 gallons of beer. Next they found a 136 gallon still, 10 fermenters and 2500 gallons of beer. The next day they destroyed a 96 gallon outfit, 7 fermenters and 500 gallons of beer. The second plant consisted of a 46 gallon still, 3 fermenters and 600 gallons of beer. In the afternoon the posse destroyed two plants. The first consisted of 8 fermenters and 2,500 gallons of beer. The second place contained 6 fermenters and 200 gallons of beer.

On Friday the officers got a 94 gallon still, 2 worms, 8 fermenters and 500 gallons of spent beer.

They found on Saturday 10 fermenters, 50 gallons of low wines and other outfits.

Newport News, March 12.—All ready for "fight or frolic," the giant super-dreadnaught, Texas, the most powerful battleship afloat, left the yard of the builders here last Thursday, for the Norfolk navy yard, to be turned over to Rear Admiral Usher. The vessel's officers and crew had been assembled so that she was ready to be placed in commission at once.

The several prisoners recently convicted in Bristol, including Raymond Stroppe and J. W. Borland and Harry Lacker, pickpockets, were taken to the State penitentiary at Richmond last week.

The whole town will cooperate with the College in making a great occasion of the Governor's visit to Marion.

Hobson to Campaign on His Motorcycle.

Mobile, Ala., March 14.—Campaign managers for Captain R. H. Hobson, who is opposing Oscar W. Underwood for the United States senate, have announced that Captain Hobson will make a motorcycle tour of the State during the ten days preceding the primary of April 6. It will enable him, so his managers say, and other candidates now are campaigning in automobiles but no candidate has ever attempted a motorcycle tour of the State.

Brazilians Paid Roosevelt for His Speech.

New York, March 16.—John P. Lenesty, of Chicago, who recently gave out a statement in London that Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, after receiving the hospitalities of the Brazilian government in Rio Janeiro, presented a bill for \$3,000 to the Historical Society of Rio Janeiro, for a short speech before the society arrived here Friday aboard the Manhattan and reiterated his statement. "Every word of it is true," said Lenesty. "Roosevelt put the Brazilian authorities to an expense of at least \$40,000 for his entertainment and then turned around and charged his hosts \$3,000 for a speech that lasted but a few minutes."

Lenesty added that he held no enmity toward Colonel Roosevelt, but felt that his actions had greatly damaged the chances of a closer understanding between the United States and the South American republics.

Radford, Va., March 16.—Howard T. Jenkins, postmaster at East Radford, died this evening of congestion of the lungs. He was 37 years old and leaves a widow and four children. Mr. Jenkins has been postmaster for nearly three years and was formerly general chairman of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen. He was also for some time secretary of the Radford city Republican committee.

When Coxey's Army Comes.

"Gen." Coxey's arrival in Washington in furtherance of his plans to make the National Capitol the camping ground of half a million socialists, more or less, demanding employment under the auspices of the general government on the plea that they have been thrown out of work in consequence of the new tariff and other legislative drives at industrial prosperity, gives the "oon to Washington" cry an aspect of grim reality that invites a degree of attention not hitherto accorded it by our municipal and Federal authorities.—Washington Post.

Children Cry FOR FLETCHER'S CASTORIA

Hon. Thos. Lee Moore Dies at Roanoke.

Thomas Lee Moore, for many years U. S. district attorney for the western district of Virginia, and well known to many Smyth county people, died at his home in Roanoke at one o'clock on Wednesday of last week. Mr. Moore was stricken with paralysis on February 21st, last, and never rallied. He was known to the bar as a fearless prosecuting officer of great mental ability.

Mr. Moore leaves a widow and several children. His wife was Edmond Hines, of Floyd county, a niece of the late Admiral Evans.

In 1895 Mr. Moore was elected Commonwealth's attorney of Montgomery County, and served a term of two years. He was a member of the 1901-1902 Virginia Constitutional Convention, which framed the present Constitution of Virginia, and in 1902 was appointed United States attorney for the Western District of Virginia, and served in that capacity for more than eight years. As a lawyer he ranked among the best in Southwest Virginia, and enjoyed a commanding practice in all the State and Federal courts, and was a member of the bar of the Supreme Court of the United States.

The postoffice at Greenlee, Rockbridge county, was broken open last Thursday night and the safe blown. The perpetrators made away with \$300 in money and stamps. No clue was left by the robbers.

Lincoln, Neb., March 17.—Nebraska woman suffragists Saturday filed with the secretary of state a petition bearing the signatures of 42,000 male voters, calling for the submission to the electors at the next election of a constitutional amendment granting women the ballot.

March 25th is the date fixed for the opening of bids for the construction of a central high school building in Bristol, Va., for the erection of which the council has authorized the expenditure of \$50,000. This building will eventually cost \$75,000, but a portion of the construction is not to be done in connection with the contract about to be let.

While out hunting near Wood's Gap, in Floyd county, last Saturday, Amos Wood, 19 years old, son of E. G. Wood, was accidentally shot in the right leg by Dexter Rakes, 15 years old. The limb was amputated. Young Wood was walking in front of Rakes, who was loading his hammerless gun when the cartridge came into contact with the firing pin and was exploded.

Legislative Review.

When the curtain fell at midnight Saturday the real drama of the legislative session was over. During a few dreary days a remnant of the membership of both houses will meet in constructive session and the presiding officers of the two bodies go through the solemn farce of signing bills, which they could well be trusted to sign in private; but the history of the Legislature of 1914 has been made, though it may be some months before it will be fully written. Indeed, it is safe to say that few of the members have any accurate idea of what measures failed and what succeeded. It is well, then, that the House by an almost unanimous vote concurred in the Senate joint resolution for a constitutional amendment restoring the old ninety-day sessions, as recommended by Governor Stuart.

There was no more notable event of the session than the passage by the House of the resolution for the initiative and referendum by a vote of 62 to 24, however the resolution failed in the Senate.

The defeat of the co-ordinate college in the House was unexpected.

The debate was sharp and dramatic, involving the names of Senators and Representatives in Congress and bitter talk of lobbies, together with passionate appeals for the chivalrous treatment of women upon one hand and for the little ragged children and Confederate veterans on the other. In the melee the women got the short end of the roll call.

A good part of the last week was occupied by the Senate in fibusters against the anti-shiping liquor bill, the anti-vice bills and other so-called moral measures, as well as against the bill to regulate sales of commissions very earnestly desired by the farmers. A cloture rule was adopted allowing six objections to prevent the consideration of a bill which operated to give a small minority the right to veto any move to take up and consider a bill or resolution to which they were opposed. This undemocratic method of legislating, which has been aptly designated "government by objection," has been employed ever since the sixty-day sessions were inaugurated and is the favorite method of the lobbies for the smothering of worthy measures they have been employed to defeat.

The resolution for woman's suffrage obtained only thirteen votes in the House, but there were many members who approved the principle and were willing to admit that it would be a winning cause before many years.

The House late Saturday night passed two extremely important measures, one permitting juries to impose a life sentence for murder in the first degree and the other raising the "age of consent" to sixteen years.

The bill to revise the Code was one of the important ones passed in the last days.

Altogether, it may be said that the Legislature that enacted these measures and also the enabling act, the bill reducing the bank tax, the repeal of the Buchanan land bill, and provided for a commission to study the fee system and imposing a maximum for the compensation of officials, while appropriating over fourteen million dollars and making provision for a tax revision and an extra session for its final accomplishment—such a legislature was indeed busy. Besides, there were hundreds of bills more or less local in their character and of minor public importance that were written upon the statute books. However, about two hundred bills perished on the calendar of the House and at least a fourth of that number on the calendar of the Senate merely for lack of opportunity to vote upon them. Most of them had been carefully considered by committees and by a cost much

thought, labor and speech that went naught in the final crush. Some day we will grow too wise to permit of this waste time and effort or to witness such wholesale denial of popular government but at present the people are helpless and their representatives in the Legislature are bound hand and foot with the fetters forged by the lobbies. Only the ignorant and the designing can uphold such a system.

Irvine Nominated by the Democrats of Ninth.

In the largest and most enthusiastic convention in their history, held in Bristol Wednesday and presided over by the Hon. Henry C. Stuart, Governor of Virginia, the Democrats of the Ninth Congressional District unanimously nominated the Hon. R. Tate Irvine, of Wise, as their candidate for Congress, and dedicated themselves to the task of redeeming the district from the Republicans at the coming November election.

It was upon the motion of Senator B. F. Burdette, one of the most talked of of the several congressional possibilities, seconded by ex-Senator R. P. Bruce, of Wise, whose name was also coupled with the nomination, that the Hon. R. Tate Irvine was declared the party's nominee by acclamation.

The convention was held at the Harmeling Opera House and the auditorium was packed with the representatives of the militant Democracy of the Ninth District, determined to sawing their district into the Democratic column at the coming election, despite six successive defeats.

The convention was called to order by J. D. Buchanan, of Smyth, the district chairman. The executive committee had selected as temporary chairman the Hon. Ezra T. Carter, of Scott, and as temporary secretary the Hon. F. E. Nelms, of Wytheville. —Herald Courier.

It was with difficulty that a contingent of the delegates to the Bristol democratic convention get the word "Progressive" written in the platform. The committee seemed to prefer the good old term conservative.

Many democrats who attended the Bristol convention did not seem to think Mr. Irvine the strongest man they could name. A gentleman from Wise County was heard to remark that another candidate prominently mentioned "could get more votes than Mr. Irvine in his own county."


