Republicans Name Royall.

Tazewell, Va., Aug. 21.—J. W. Powell Royall, a young Tazewell lawyer and ex-member of the legislature of Virginia, was nominated at Richards last Saturday for the State Senate from the counties of Tazewell, Russell, Buchanan and Dickenson on the Republican ticket. Mr. Royall is a self-made man, having forged his way to the front mainly through his own efforts, and his family connections in Tazewell county makes his candidacy for the Senate a formidable stumbling block in the way of a candidate going to that body from this Senatorial district. The Democrats will call a convention within a few days and name a candidate for the opposition.

Radford Votes Dry.

East Radford, Va., Aug. 19.—The drys won the local option election here Thursday by 146 majority in a total vote of 396. Two years ago the dry majority was 105. The election was marked by good order, although large numbers of workers were near the polls and many votes were challenged on various protests.

Lutheran Synod at Radford

Radford, Va., Aug. 21.—The 17th annual convention of the Lutheran Synod of Southwestern Virginia convened last week in Christ's Lutheran church at Radford, Va. A large number of pastors and delegates were on hand for the opening session. At eleven o'clock the annual sermon was preached by the president, the Rev. L. A. Fox, D. D., of Salem, after which the Holy Communion was administered.

The Synod was opened at 2:30 in the afternoon, when the president's report was read, as well as the reports of the standing committees and the special committees were appointed.

At the night session an able address was delivered by the Rev. R. L. Patterson, D. D., of Charlotte, N. C., president of the board of home missions of the United Synod of the South, in which he presented the various needs and opportunities of home mission work and especially urged the need of consecrated men in the service. He was preceded by the Rev. K. Y. Umberger, of Wytheville, who presented the work in the Southwestern Virginia Synod.

Thursday morning the reports of committees were received and other routine work attended to. President Morehead gave his report on Roanoke College, in which he referred to the past session as being in many respects the best in the history of that institution and that the prospects for an increased enrollment the coming year was most encouraging.

Will Texas Be Divided?

When Texas came into the Union, provision was made for its division into at least five States, in case the people should approve such division. Many times the idea of making a number of States out of the immense territory has been discussed and has found much favor. But pride in being parts of "the imperial domain of all the States" has antedated the people against partition.

Just now the bitterness caused by the prohibition fight has served to renew the discussion. Most of the "dry" counties are in the northern end of the State, and the "wet" constitute the greater part of the southern section. The people of these two divisions are strayed against each other so bitterly that nothing short of "secession" from one or the other would seem to be satisfactory.—Columbus Journal.

Monument to Clark.

Washington, Aug. 21.—A \$150,000 monument to the memory of General George Rogers Clark, to be erected in Jefferson county, Ky., is provided for in a bill passed by the Senate Saturday. President Taft, former President Roosevelt, Associate Justice Harlan, of the Supreme Court of the United States; Speaker Champ Clark, of the House, and Governor Thomas R. Marshall, of Indiana, are named members of the commission to select the location and design.

Says Swanson is Unfit.

Norfolk, Va., Aug. 22.—The editorial declaration in the Richmond Times-Dispatch yesterday that Senator C. A. Swanson is "unfit to represent Virginia in the United States Senate" because of his stock gambling, was easily the sensation in politics here and in Portsmouth yesterday. The editorial was widely read and commented upon. Copies of the Times-Dispatch were gobbled up and carried along the streets by the enthusiastic Glass men and were shown to nearly every street pedestrian.
 Glass supporters on all sides are predicting victory for the anti-machine senatorial ticket. Some of them say the Times-Dispatch editorial will change 5,000 votes in the State. Extra Session Now History.

Washington, Aug. 23.—The first session of the Sixty-second Congress ended yesterday and immediately the exodus of members began. President Taft joined with several hundred tired legislators in the begonia and official Washington, comparatively, was deserted. Every outgoing train bore Senators and Representatives on their homeward journey after an extraordinary session that stretched over one hundred and twenty-one days and set the liveliest pace of any legislative session in many years.

The adjournment was featureless, despite the strenuous activity that had gone before. The President vetoed the cotton tariff revision bill, just as he had vetoed its two revision predecessors, the wool and free list bills. The veto went only to the House, in accordance with custom, and there its reception was marked by Democratic laughter and Republican applause.

The country editor is, however, known to everybody and his personality is familiar to all. He may exert a powerful influence on the community through this close personal contact. The country editor, remarks the Spantansburg (Pa.) Sentinel, ushers the newly born citizen into the world, watches its progress to manhood and womanhood, rejoices at the happy marriages, and notes with appropriate solemnity the exit of the person from the plane of life's activity. "Thus the country editor is known to all and everybody knows him. The village newspaper is the record of the community; joys and sorrows alike receive the editor's sympathy; he admonishes when necessary, gives praise when it is due. He is our advisor and our guide of public opinion. This close companionship should work for good. The field of the rural newspaper is equalled by none. Let us assist the country editor in his work and his building up a higher social organization.—Exchange.

Two More States Can Join the Union.

Washington, Aug. 22.—President Taft yesterday afternoon signed the Statehood bill admitting the Territories of Arizona and New Mexico to the Union. This act ends a fight which has continued more than 20 years for the admission of the territories. Only the territories themselves can now hold up the issuance of the final proclamation, adding two stars to the flag.

While the enabling act is now amended to admit these two territories, both of them will have to hold elections before admission becomes a fact. In New Mexico it will be necessary to amend the constitution to make it easier of future amendment. The constitution of Arizona must be amended by striking out the "re-call of judges" clause before it becomes law.

Will Not Be a Candidate.

Meeting of Lebanon Association.

The Lebanon Baptist Association convened in its Sixty-sixth Annual Session on last Wednesday with the Grosses Creek church, six miles south of Chilhowie, and remained in session for three days. The body was organized with the election of M. M. Morris, of Glade Spring, moderator; Dr. J. M. Shelbourn, of Bristol, vice-moderator, and Rev. C. T. Taylor, clerk and treasurer. The Association is composed of about forty churches, located in Wythe, Smyth and Washington counties and the City of Bristol, with a membership of nearly 3,500. Thirty-three of the forty churches were represented by letter and delegates. The reports showed more than \$3,000 contributed to missions and objects of general benevolence and about \$10,000 to all home purposes. Gregory, of Staunton, a representative of the Home Mission Board, was present and delivered an address on the objects of the Home Board. Reports showed thirty Sunday schools in the various churches of the association with an enrollment of more than 3,000 teachers and scholars. The report on temperance was made by I. L. Nane, of Bristol, followed by a strong paper from Dr. N. W. Denton, of Abingdon, and an address by Rev. A. B. Brooks. Dr. J. T. Henderson, president of Virginia Intermount College, was present, and made several fine addresses, especially on Foreign Missions and General Education. The delegated attendance was good and the general attendance large. The members of Grosses Creek church, assisted by all the citizens of the community, were generous in their hospitality and all delegates and visitors were well cared for and entertained.

The next meeting of the body will be held with Mountain View Baptist church in Washington county, three miles north of Meadow View, beginning Thursday before the 3rd Sunday in August, 1912. The introductory sermon will be preached by Dr. J. M. Shelbourn, of Bristol.

The Negro building will present an array of products of the negro handicraft, including jams, jellies, breads, cakes, and other articles included in domestic science. A number of special days have been arranged for the negroes. On "Negro Day" the negroes will have a gala parade through the streets of Knoxville and the exposition grounds. This will be led by Sergt. Houston Lust, who has served with distinction in the United States army.

The Negro building is located at the northern extremity of the exposition park, removed from other buildings and grounds and at the same time conveniently accessible from all parts. The building will be open to white visitors, as well as to colored, and it is a matter of record that thousands of white people saw and praised the negro exhibits last year, and pronounced the displays as worthy of any other building in the exposition enclosure and as typical of substantial progress of the negro race.
