Honaker, Va., April 3.—The Republican of Russell county met in convention here Saturday. A large crowd was present, filling the Opera House. Each district in the county was fully represented. After a spirited and somewhat heated contest, the following ticket was selected:

Member of House of Delegates, C. U. Maynard; Clerk, J. A. Henritze; Treasurer, John Hurt; Commonwealth's Attorney, H. A. Routh; Commissioner of Revenue, Eastern district, James Slate; Western district, Ora Salyer; Sheriff, Geo. W. Gilmer.

Some genuine surprises were sprung in the selection of some candidates, but upon the whole the ticket is a satisfactory one to the majority of the voters of the party.

Rocky Mount, Va., April 4.—The Republicans of the county held a mass meeting here yesterday and nominated a ticket for the November election. The meeting was largely attended and the following officers were unanimously nominated: For the legislature, J. Visgit Cannaday; for sheriff, Henry Dudley. No nominations were made for clerk, treasurer or Commonwealth's attorney. For commissioner of revenue, First district, Wm. C. Hodges.

Delegates were also named to the joint convention of Franklin and Floyd to nominate a candidate for the State Senate.

Mike Steffey, known throughout Virginia as "The Banner Man," is dead. Death claimed this popular writer of humor at 7:30 o'clock last Friday morning, he having succumbed to an attack of pneumonia.

Mr. Steffey was editor and published of the Rural Retreat Times, in Wythe county, Va. He made a State reputation through his humorous sketches, under the nom de plume, "The Banner Man," and his writings were widely quoted. Because of the sunshine and good cheer which he distributed through his writings, he was greatly beloved by the people of Southwest Virginia, and the fact that his pen is now stilled forever, and his good humor, touching current events and conditions, is at an end, will be the occasion for profound sadness among hundreds of people in his own county and in most of the other counties of Southwest Virginia.

Mr. Steffey was forty years of age. He had been the editor and publisher of the Rural Retreat Times for several years. He married Miss Luck Willard, and she survives him, no children having been born to them.

Will Meet Jones and Glass on Stump.

Norfolk, Va., April 4.—It was announced last night that both Senators Thos. S. Martin and Claude A. Swanson would meet Representatives William A. Jones and Carter Glass in joint debate. The Senatorial campaign, just now waxing warm in Virginia, promises to develop more political sensations than this old State has witnessed in many years.

The "independents" are preparing to make charges concerning the conduct of primary elections. They will hold that Governor Mann did not defeat Harry St. George Tucker, and will even go so far back as when Martin defeated the late Fitzhugh Lee for the Senate. They will also have much to say concerning the alleged part the railroads have played in campaigns in this State.

Washington and Grayson Line Settled.

Abingdon, Va., April 4.—The commissioners appointed by the courts of this and Grayson counties to locate and establish the true boundary line between the two counties, have compiled the work and made their report. This commission was appointed in May, 1906. This county was represented by Jas. L. White, A. L. Robinson, A. A. Meek, W. B. Robertson and W. J. Soodgrass. The commissioners for Grayson county were H. C. W. Weaver, J. L. Richardson, J. W. Perkins and J. C. Padgett.

In 1853 a similar commission was appointed but the report of that commission was not satisfactory to the Grayson representatives and was not accepted or recorded in that county.

The original call of the line is along the top of Iron Mountain. In that section the mountain is cut up into many spurs and ridges and the dispute arose from the fact that it could not easily be determined where the top of the mountain really is. The contention of Grayson county was that it followed a certain course which, if followed, would have located the towns of Damascus and Kouarock in that county. The recent commission after making an accurate survey, established a new corner on the top of White Top, at a point established by a recent coast geodetic survey as the highest point in the range. The altitude of this point, according to the government officials, is 5,678 feet above the sea. The figures are chiseled in a rock at that point. This change gives to Grayson county about 300 acres of land heretofore regarded as belonging to this county. It is very rough and and no one lives on it. The old field, as it is called, which is above the timber line, is still owned about equally by the two counties.

This dispute of long standing, can now be regarded as settled for all time.

Each precinct will be entitled to cast one vote for every twenty-five votes, and majority fraction thereof cast for Bascom Slemp in the last congressional election. All Republicans and those who will support the county ticket are invited to attend and participate in the proceedings of said meeting.

Good Roads Will Cost the Taxpayers Naught.

The railroads make very large investments of bonds to improve their roadbeds so they can haul larger loads. The Norfolk and Western has sold many millions of bonds for this purpose and in the past few years has increased its train load from 1,100 tons to over 2,000 tons and thus raised the annual net profits from nothing to about \$12,000,000 a year. The same argument applies to county roads. We can make large profits from the sale of bonds and the making of good roads by increasing our wagon load.

For illustration, suppose we are moving over the roads of Tazewell county 100,000 tons a year, the average load being a half ton. If the cost of outfitting a team and a wagon and driver is \$100, the cost will be \$200,000 to move the tonnage of the county. Now, if, by making good roads, we can increase the wagon load to one ton, the cost of moving this tonnage will be \$100,000 or a saving of \$100,000 a year. The interest and sinking fund of the proposed bond issue is about \$40,000 a year, so a profit of \$60,000 a year is made. These figures are considered to be conservative by some intelligent county men. To this we can add increased values of property, comforts and facilities of life and happiness and just pride in beautiful Tazewell county, so richly endowed by blue-grass lands, well watered, and well timbered, and the greatest coal field in the world. We can certainly do what less favored counties east and west are doing and prospering from.

A travelling man tells us that the whole State of North Carolina is making good roads and bridges as rapidly as possible. All the people are alive to the advantages. The small farmer obtains a direct and most important advantage from good roads. On the McAdam roads leading into towns a constant stream of farm wagons is seen bringing to market once or twice a week fruits, vegetables, eggs, chickens, butter, grain and everything the farmer, his wife and children have prepared for the market. This brings in a weekly cash income making the smallest of farms profitable.—Bluefield Telegraph.



Death of Maj. Wilson Faris Major Wilson Faris was born in Smyth county, Va., Dec. 30, 1839, and died April 3, 1911, being seventy-one years, three months and three days old at the time of his death. He was married to Mary J. Durman of Montgomery county, Va., Jan. 14, 1864, and to this union were born twelve children, nine of them who survive him with their mother; twenty-five grand children, and two great grand children. In the year 1861, he entered the army and served through the war except a few months while disabled by being pierced through by a ball from the enemies gun in the battle of Spottsylvania Court House. A wound from which he for forty-seven years suffered and never recovered; and was perhaps the principal cause of his death. At the age of fourteen years he professed faith in Christ and became a member of Middle Fork church, being a consistent and esteemed member of same until his death, having served as deacon, clerk and treasurer for a number of years, showing the same courage that was shown upon many a blood-stained field of battle. Not only did this brave crop out on the battlefield, but in his every-day walk of life this same courage was characteristic in his struggle to rear and provide for a large family, while unceasingly he bore pain all these years; and when the grim monster, death, was gnawing at the very rootlets of vitality his courage never faltered, but he bore it all patiently and without a murmur to the end. The funeral was conducted from Middle Fork church by Rev. C. W. Trainham, of Marion, assisted by Revs. C. T. Taylor, of Bristol, and W. B. Order for Election on Bond Issue.

VIRGINIA: At a Circuit Court continued and held for Smyth county, at the Court House thereof, on Tuesday, the 21st day of March, 1911:

This day came the Board of Supervisors of Smyth county, by their attorney, and presented a petition signed by the members of the said Board, praying the Court to enter an order requiring the Judges of the Election for Smyth county, to open a poll on the 2nd day of May, 1911, to take the sense of the qualified voters of said county, whether the Board of Supervisors of said county, shall issue bonds of Smyth county to an amount not exceeding \$250,000.00, said bonds to bear interest at the rate six per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually, on the 1st day of January and July of each year, and to run for a period of thirty years, from date when issued with the privilege of redeeming said bonds, or any of them, at any interest paying period after fifteen years from date of bonds, said bonds to be issued for the various Magisterial districts of said county, as follows:

- 1st. To permanently improve the main public road from Pugh's Sidling up Rye Valley to the county line, near Cedar Springs, distance about five miles.
- 2d. To permanently improve the road from the residence of the late John S. Apperson to Lyon's Gap, 12 feet wide, distance about 3 miles.
- 3d. To permanently improve the road from Lindsey Walker's to Middle Fork church, 10 feet wide, distance 1/2 mile.
- 4th. To permanently improve the road leading from Preston's bridge to Mrs. Copenhaver's barn, about 1 mile, width 10 feet.
- 5th. To permanently improve the road leading from Noah St. John's to A. F. Bonham's, 10 feet wide, distance about one mile.
- 6th. To permanently improve the road leading from Seven Mile Ford school house North, distance about 1 mile, 10 feet wide.
- 7th. To permanently improve the road from Preston's Mill to D. C. Gollehon's, 10 feet wide, distance about 1 mile.
- 8th. To permanently improve the road leading from the Rock road by way of R. L. Humphrey's, ten feet wide, distance about 1 mile.
- 9th. To permanently improve the road leading from the residence of Levi Cole, to a point on the White Top turnpike, distance a four one mile.
- 10th. To permanently improve the road near John Callihan's residence, distance about one mile.
- 11th. To permanently improve the road from Baker's store to the public road near John Callihan's residence, distance about one mile.
- 12th. To permanently improve the road from the residence of Adam Miller, distance one-half mile.
- 13th. To permanently improve the road from the iron bridge at River-side for the forks of the road near H. F. Cole's, distance about one-half mile.
- 14th. To permanently improve the road from the residence of E. S. Neff's to a point in the road leading to Marion, on Dr. McKee farm, distance about one-fourth mile.
- 15th. To permanently improve the road from the residence of Daniel Blankenbeckler's house, and extending East to the District line, distance about one and one-fourth miles.
- 16th. To permanently improve the public road leading from Holstein Mills passing Henry Dutton's residence to a point in the Marion road at Talbert Elsworth's, distance about one and one-fourth miles.
- 17th. To permanently improve the public road from what is known as the Thomas bridge to the district line, near Henderson Wolfe's, distance about one and one-fourth miles.
- 18th. To permanently improve the public road from Thomas' bridge East up Rye Valley road to Laurel Hill school-house, distance about five miles.
- 19th. To permanently improve the main public road from Pugh's Sidling up Rye Valley to the county line, near Cedar Springs, distance about five miles.
- 20th. To permanently improve the road from the residence of the late John S. Apperson to Lyon's Gap, 12 feet wide, distance about 3 miles.
- 21st. To permanently improve the road from Lindsey Walker's to Middle Fork church, 10 feet wide, distance 1/2 mile.
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
