A BLOODY TRAGEDY.

Young William Roberts Killed by James Russell.

FLAT RIDGE, GRAYSON Co. July 17.

—A fatal shooting affray occurred about one mile from this place on last Thursday evening about 4 o'clock.

The particulars, as far as we have been able to gather we give the Times:

Two young men, Stephen Perkins and William Roberts, had been to Fox Creek on some business, and on their return, about 4 o'clock Thursday evening were met in the road by a man named James Russell who was carrying a shot gun.

The boys spoke to Russell in a very polite manner, asking about his health, to which Russell replied, "it's none of your business." Then Roberts turning around facing Russell replied "what?"

At this Russell leveled his gun fired the fatal shot striking Roberts in the breast and he fell to the ground.

Perkins ran to Roberts to try and give him some relief, but Russell not satisfied with shooting Roberts struck at Perkins with his gun, but Perkins seeing Russell's movements in time dodged the blow and snatching the gun from Russell's hands and threw it on the ground.

Russell's thirst for blood not being yet quenched made at Perkins with his pocket knife, Perkins picked up the gun and struck the man Russell a heavy blow felling him to the ground.

In the mean time one of Russell's boys had pelted Perkins heavily with stones and was standing near by at the end of the fight and received a blow from the barrel of the broken gun in connection with that of his father.

Perkins then went to where Roberts was lying and found that he was already dead. Perkins immediately spread the news of the killing and the remains of young Roberts were taken to the residence of Joseph Ross, and interred near by on the 14th inst.

The officers have not as yet succeeded in arresting Russell. E. W. R.

Richmond Exposition.

Quite a large and enthusiastic meeting of the citizens of Smyth county was held in the court room on last Monday for the purpose of taking steps toward securing a county exhibit at the Richmond Exposition.

The meeting was called to order by Judge Geo. Richardson in a few appropriate remarks stated the object of the meeting and the advantages would arise from a creditable county exhibit at Richmond.

On motion Maj. Pendleton and C. D. Carter was called to the chair, and B. F. Buchanan and W. E. Williams, elected secretaries. B. F. Buchanan then presented the following resolutions which were unanimously adopted:

1. That it is advisable that Smyth county make a creditable Exhibit at the Richmond Exposition of her agricultural and mineral wealth.

2. That the Judge, Commonwealth Attorney, Clerk, Treasurer, Sheriff, Supt. Pub. Schools and Supervisors of the county be hereby constituted a board of the county to select a proper person to make a collection of the minerals, agricultural products, &c., and to do everything necessary in forwarding the same, and in securing room for the exhibit, &c.

That the Supervisors of the county make an appropriation of \$1,000, to be drawn by the Commissioner subject to approval of the chairman of the county board as above constituted for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the above recommendation.

A. M. Dickenson, Col. Wm. E. Peters and Dr. G. W. Hubble make practical remarks showing the results which will likely follow from the action of the meeting.

DEMOCRATIC DISSECTION.

Kentucky Democrats Who Will Abandon Cleveland.

LOUISVILLE, July 13.—The presidential campaign is growing very warm here in Kentucky, and the tariff question has caused a lively breaking away from party lines. Louisville has a great many woolen mills and these manufacturers are very restive over the utterances of Cleveland. One of the most prominent of these is Henry W. Barrett of the Eclipse Woolen mills, who said in an interview today:

"I am going to vote the Republican ticket this year for the first time in my life. I have heretofore been a Democrat, but have never considered myself hide-bound. I am voting this time for platform and not for party. The tariff idea as presented by the Democracy does not suit me; the protection to home manufacturers as vouchsafed by the Republican declaration of principles does, and in voting for self interest I feel that I am voting for the best interests of the country."

Meade Robinson and Bonnie Robinson, of the Bear Grass mills, were reported as being among the converts to the Republican side. He said "I don't know whether I shall vote the Republican ticket or not, but I do know that I won't vote for Cleveland. If I had not declared for the tariff issue so close I believe he would easily, but I have the worst beaten ever put up."

There was made a difference in the two parties. But I have the hot end of the Protection not alone self interest, but for the welfare of the country. Protection to labor and the products of labor men is also the Protection of the products of the farm. If I lived in Indiana or some state where my vote would count, I would most certainly vote for Harrison and Morton, and I believe the Republicans will carry Indian, New Jersey and very probably New York."

Lawrence Richardson, of the old Kentucky Woolen mills has expressed his intentions of voting the Republican ticket on account of the tariff issue.

Dennis Long and his son George Long, are the richest iron and pipe manufacturers in Louisville. They are both reported as converts to the Republican ticket, but the latter would not express himself for publication, further than to say that he could not vote for the Democratic nominees with such a plank in the platform. He added that all iron men would oppose the Democratic ticket.
