Bristol May Be Unique in Having 2 Postoffices.

Bristol, Virginia, will have a separate postoffice. At any rate this is the latest news from the National capital. It seems that the preliminary work has all been completed and that Representative C. B. Slemple will have his way in the matter.

A gentleman who has just arrived here from Washington, but who intimated that he did not care to have his name mentioned, lest somebody might think he was meddling, said that the only information he was able to gain regarding the Bristol situation was that it had practically been determined that a separate post office would be established.

It is learned in this connection that the postoffice inspector who was sent here for the purpose of making an estimate of the probable cost of an additional office for Bristol, Va., reported to the department in an itemized statement, that it would cost in excess of \$10,000 extra per annum to establish and maintain a separate postoffice on the Virginia side of Bristol. These figures, it is said, were submitted to Representative Slemple, with the understanding that the establishment of such an office might call for a Congressional investigation on account of the necessary expense. Mr. Slemple, being a member of the committee on postoffice expenditures, is said to have assured the department that he would stand for any investigation that might be made. And, it is said, with this understanding the department has practically determined to establish the new office.

It is decided, and has been for some time, that Gaylord E. Goodell, chairman of the City Republican Executive committee, is to be postmaster in Bristol, Va. Mr. Goodell has understood all along that in the event of establishing of such an office he would be named as the postmaster.—Bristol Herald Courier.

Message of Cheer Carried to Taft.

Beverly, Mass., Sept. 18.—"God-speed" and the "support of business New England," were the messages of cheer carried to President Taft last week by Herbert N. Davison, of Worcester, Mass., President of the New England Association of Commercial Executives, and eighty members of that association, who motored to Parramatta to say good-bye to the Chief Executive before he started west.

"As you go out from among us on your long and arduous tour," said Mr. Davison, "we want you to go with the god speed of New England ringing in your ears. Other sections may waver, but we will not. You are President, and as such are entitled to our sympathy, our loyalty and our unflinching trust. And you have this in abundant measure."

The pledge of support to the President was as plain and hearty as the god-speed. Mr. Davison, applauded frequently by his associates, approved the President's course on reciprocity; his policy of conservation, and his determination that the tariff shall only be revised, if he is responsible, when a non-partisan body of men shall have reported that reductions are warranted. Even if the "passion of the hour" precludes approval of the President's action at this time, Mr. Davison declared, history will justify him.

The great masses of the people, all of whom would be vitally affected by any radical change for the worse in their living conditions," said he, "are singularly dependent upon you, and although they may be temporarily misled, in the end they will realize that you are what we all know you to be, their true and lasting friend."

Replying, President Taft said: "I am very much touched by your coming here to bid me god-speed on this trip which I am to take. I am going to do the best I can on this trip to talk to the people on the issues of the day—not alone the political issues, for there are a great many issues that it is well for the people to consider that do not attract politicians at all. They are the issues that do not figure in the headlines and yet contribute much to the welfare of the people, and it is well for the people to understand them.

"I have not referred to the issues which your spokesman has touched with so much eloquence, because I do not think it necessary. Regarding reciprocity, the arbitration treaties and the tariff, you know where I stand, and it is not necessary for me to convince those who are of the same opinion that I am."

In beginning his address, Mr. Davison said that the delegates present represented twenty-eight commercial organizations in six States, and he was acting as "business spokesman for more than 2,000,000 people."

Man and Wife Murdered.

Tazewell, Va., Sept. 17.—Floyd Taylor and his wife, respected citizens of Russell county, were both killed at their home on Chaney creek last Friday by Jim Bingham, an outlaw from Kentucky. Details of the shooting are meagre, but from the best information it is learned that Bingham went to the Taylor home drunk and took dinner there. While eating he drew his pistol and shot a few times in the loft of the building. Taylor objected and said: "D— you, you can't burn powder in my home," and Bingham immediately aimed his gun at Taylor, fired and killed him instantly. He then addressed Taylor's wife saying, "Baby, let's go home." She refused to accede to his demands and he shot her through the right breast from which she died in a few minutes.

He then turned his gun on a girl who was employed in the Taylor home and attempted to kill her, but she struck the gun as he fired and the bullet went wild.

Otis Powers, another white man who was present, was attacked and shot at, but the bullet never bit.

The bodies of Taylor and his wife were shipped to their former home in Pineville, Ky.

Big Stone Gap, Va., Sept. 18.—Word was received here Saturday night of the killing of Cleveland Litton, son of M. F. Litton, of Dot, Lee county, by Hyatt Slemple, son of Luther Slemple, of Pennington Gap. **Son of Joe Wheeler Now
Major in U. S. A.**

Decatur, Ala., Sept. 18.—The lit-
 tle village of Wheeler station, nine-
 teen miles west of Decatur, on the
 Southern railroad, is rejoicing over
 the news just recently received to
 the effect that Capt. Joe Wheeler,
 Jr., of the United States army, has
 been promoted to the rank of major
 with the United States coast artill-
 ery.
 The young major is the only living
 son of the late noted General Joe
 Wheeler, who was known from one
 end of the country to the other as
 "Fighting Little Joe" Wheeler. It
 was at Wheeler station that General
 Joe Wheeler lived for many years in
 his comfortable plantation home sur-
 rounded by a plantation of 20,000
 rich acres. It is at this old planta-
 tion home that Major Joe Wheeler's
 venerable mother and a brothe, who
 was drowned at Montank Point, N.
 Y., lie sleeping in a little plot of
 ground set aside as a family burying
 ground. Miss Annie Wheeler, who
 was with her father on the field of
 battle during the war with Spain as
 a nurse, and another unmarried
 daughter of the late General Joe
 Wheeler, make their home still on
 the old plantation at Wheeler station.
 The vast Wheeler estate there is su-
 perintended largely by Miss Annie
 Wheeler.

**Republicans for Abolition
of Dispensary.**

At the Republican convention held
 at Abingdon last Saturday, A. T.
 Lincoln was nominated for re-elec-
 tion to the State Senate from Wash-
 ington, Smyth and Bristol city and
 Judge J. W. McBroom and W. R.
 Kestner were nominated for the
 lower house from Bristol city and
 Washington county. The nominees
 were placed on a platform pledging
 them to the abolition of the Abing-
 don dispensary by legislative enact-
 ment. This is one of the liveliest
 issues in the county and the Republi-
 cans take a bold stand against the
 institution and in favor of wiping it
 out in the legislature.

A. Gray Gilmer served as tempo-
 rary chairman of the Senatorial con-
 vention. He was elected permanent
 chairman. Senator Lincoln was re-
 nominated without opposition.

For representatives Judge Mc-
 Broom and W. R. Kestner, who were
 candidates two years ago, were nomi-
 nated. Judge McBroom got fifty-
 seven votes; Kestner fifty-three; Dr.
 E. E. Pippin, twenty-three, and Geo.
 W. Hammit, of Bristol, nineteen.
 A large delegation went to Abing-
 don from Bristol. G. E. Goodell
 was made chairman of the legislative
 convention. The meeting was large-
 ly attended and harmonious.

THE PLATFORM.

The Republican party of the First
 Senatorial district of Virginia pre-
 sent this declaration of principles
 and confidently appeal to the well
 intending voters of the district for
 its support.

First—As Republicans, we believe
 in the principles of the Republican
 party as enunciated in our national
 platform and declare our unalter-
 able devotion to and confidence in

 unimportant part taken by Virginia
 in the great national government
 that has been carried on by the Re-
 publican party within the last fifty
 years, and it is our purpose to relieve
 her from the bonds of the Democr-
 atic mis-rule and once more place her
 in the front ranks of the States of
 this Union.

HOME RULE.

Third—We believe that the best
 government that the people can have
 is that government where all officers
 are selected by the people, and we
 denounce the Democratic party of
 the State of Virginia for its action
 in taking from the people the right
 to select the most important officers
 of our government.

By thus depriving the people of
 their rights they have:

First—Placed the schools in the
 hands of politicians; made them par-
 tisan, and of but little service to
 the State.

Second—They have placed the
 roads of Washington county in the
 hands of politicians, and made the
 workings of the roads partisan and
 of such little value that the taxes
 of the people are wasted and the
 roads are useless. The condition of
 our public roads are a disgrace to
 civilization, a hindrance to the pro-
 gress and development of our coun-
 try, a monument to the inefficiency
 of Democratic control.

Third—They have placed the elec-
 tion machinery of the State in the
 hands of politicians, thereby mak-
 ing our elections the instruments in
 the hands of scheming politicians
 for their own advancement, and des-
 troying the purity of the ballot and
 subjecting the people to many out-
 rages at the hands of dishonest elec-
 tion officials.

PUBLIC EDUCATION.

Fourth—The free schools, the
 hope of our people, should be care-

fully fostered by the State, and we
 pledge ourselves to better schools, to
 better teachers, to more and better
 equipped school houses and longer
 terms.

TEMPERANCE.

The Republican party favors de-
 cency in public and private life; be-
 lieves in temperance and pledges its
 support to every effort looking to the
 improvement of the condition of the
 people.

THE LIQUOR QUESTION.

Fifth—As a general proposition
 we favor the traditional Republican
 doctrine of leaving to the people of
 each community affected thereby the
 right to decide whether intoxicating
 liquor shall be sold among them and
 the condition of such sale, if allow-
 ed, trusting to their sound judg-
 ment to determine this great ques-
 tion in each locality.

ABINGDON DISPENSARY.

The legalized sale of whiskey by
 the Town of Abingdon, a always a
 curse to the people of Washington
 county and disgrace to our civiliza-
 tion, has, in addition thereto, be-
 come a hot-bed of corruption and
 evil influences socially and political-
 ly in our county. The settlement
 of this question, so important to
 the people of Washington county, we at
 one time were willing to leave to the
 restricted electorate of that commu-
 nity, but the will of the politicians
 and the people who profit thereby
 has prevailed, and the expectations
 of the people have been disappoint-
 ed, and recognizing the inability of
 the good people of Abingdon to re-
 lieve themselves as against the poli-
 ticians where the number of voters
 is so limited, we do

Resolve, That said dispensary
 shall be abolished by legislative en-
 actment, and we pledge the nomi-
 nees of this convention to bring a-
 bout the abolition of this blot upon
 our civilization by legislative enact-
 ment, if elected.

Sixth—We declare ourselves in
 favor of the election of a traveling
 auditor of the State, whose busi-
 ness it shall be, at proper intervals, to
 inspect and examine the books and
 accounts of all State and County of-
 ficials, thus preventing scandal and
 saving the State and County large
 sums of money that would be other-
 wise diverted from its proper chan-
 nel.

HONEST ELECTIONS.

Seventh—Firmly believing that
 the purity of the ballot is the safe-
 guard of the State, we pledge our-
 selves, if placed in power, to non-
 partisan electoral boards, composed
 of representatives of the leading par-
 ties and elected by the people at the
 regular elections, thus insuring to
 the people an honest count of the
 ballot, unfalsified returns, and af-
 fording protection to every voter of
 every political creed, from the out-
 rages of dishonest election officials.





New York, Sept. 19.—Preparations were completed today by J. Pierpont Morgan, Jas. G. Cannon, president of the Fourth National Bank; Cyrus H. McCormick, president of the International Harvester Co., and a number of other millionaires for the beginning of a monster religious revival, to be prosecuted in 1,576 cities and towns in the United States and Canada. It will be the greatest religious movement of its kind ever undertaken in this country.

The plan was scheduled to be inaugurated with a meeting of 500 clergymen late this afternoon in the Broadway Tabernacle. Mr. Morgan has contributed largely toward the necessary expense, and others have contributed from \$500 to \$5,000 towards the revival.

The feature of this revival, distinguishing it from all other similar movements, is that it is distinctly in charge of laymen as its directors. It will be prosecuted by a committee of ninety-seven. Seventy-six of the leading cities of the U. S. and Canada will be the centers of the revival work and 1200 smaller places. It is planned to begin the work by October 2nd.
