The Platform of 1914

As Adopted by the Republican National Convention.
—Aliens, Naturalization; Philippines

The unprecedented living conditions in Europe fol-
lowing the world war created a condition by which we
were threatened with mass immigration that would
have seriously disturbed our economic life. The law
recently enacted is designed to protect the inhabitant of
our country, not only the American citizens, but also the
alien already with us who is seeking to secure an economic
foothold for himself and family from the competition
which would come from unrestricted immigration. The
administrative features of the law represent a great con-
structive advance, and eliminate the hardships suffered
by immigrants under the emergency statutes.

We favor the adoption of methods which will exert
a helpful influence among the foreign born population
and, provide for the education of the alien in our lan-
guage, customs, ideals and standards of life. We favor the
improvement of our naturalization laws.

The Philippine policy of the party has been and is
inspired by the belief that our duty toward the Filipino
people is a national obligation which should remain en-
tirely free from partisan politics.

In accepting the obligations which came to them
with the control of the Philippine Islands, the American
people had only the wish to serve, advance, and improve
the condition of the Filipino people. That though will
continue to be the dominating factor in the American
consideration of the many problems which must inevi-
tably grow out of our relationship to these people.

If the time comes when it is evident to Congress that
independence would be better for the people of the
Philippines with respect to both their domestic concerns
and their status in the world, and the Filipino people
then desire complete independence, the American govern-
ment will gladly accord it. A careful study of the con-
ditions of the Philippine islands has convinced us that
the time for such action has not yet arrived.

**MOTORCYCLE COPS TO BE PUT
ON VIRGINIA STATE HIGH-
WAYS**

Richmond, Va.,—as a result of
complaints coming from various parts
of the state, that speeders and road
"hogs" are usurping the state high-
ways, a force of ten special depu-
ties, empowered to arrest traffic
violators and operators of unlicensed
automobiles will be placed on the
state roads within a week or ten
days.

Most of the complaints came from
people along the highway between
here and Newport News, Richmond
and Petersburg, Richmond and Fred-
ricksburg, Richmond and Charlottes-
ville, the Valley Pike, Abingdon,
Clinch Valley and Petersburg to
Blackstone, he said.

Motorcycles for the deputies have
been ordered and they are expected
to be received soon.

The first year the automobile law
went into effect the revenues were
increased by \$500,000 and the year
following the officers still further in-
creased the revenues by \$700,000, he
asserted. He believes that hundreds

of cars on which there are no licens-
es at this time will be reported and
the drivers fined.

PRESIDENT COOLIDGE'S LABOR DAY ADDRESS

President Coolidge's Labor day speech was one of the most notable utterances of the year. Unlike certain other speeches of the day, it was not an appeal to class consciousness. It did not seek to array labor against capital, the employed against the employer. On the contrary it pointed out the common interest of all elements of our population in the maintenance of those policies which contribute to general prosperity.

Labor has no more dangerous enemy than the politician who preaches the demagogic doctrine that the way to promote the welfare of the worker is to strike at productive industry and therefore at employment. The wage earner has as much at stake in the protection and promotion of legitimate business enterprise as has the investor. Those who suffer most in periods of industrial depression are those who receive their portion of prosperity in the weekly pay envelope.

As President Coolidge points out, the theory of American government does not contemplate class domination in any form. We do not want in the United States a farm government, a labor government, a manufacturers' government or a merchant's government. We want a government which does justice to every element in our industrial life, which offers the freest possible play consistent with justice to enterprise and to labor, and which holds forth to all the opportunity for advancement.

The status of the American worker is the envy of the world. This is not a theory, but a condition, easily demonstrated by the statistics which set forth the actual and relative remuneration of the American wage earner. The statistics of savings banks deposits, of home ownership, of automobile ownership, of insurance, all tell a story of diffused prosperity without parallel in the history of this or any other nation.

President Coolidge points out the relationship of the Republican policy of protection to our incomparably higher standard of wages and living. This American standard cannot be maintained in the face of the unregulated influx into the United States either of labor accustomed to lower standards of life or the product of this labor brought into direct competition with the output of the American farm and mill.

We need protection, too, as President Coolidge says, against the importation of European political and economic ideas, the product of political and economic conditions differing greatly from our own. We want to keep America American. The spurious internationalism which would seek to help the rest of the world by destroying the standards of life which have been erected here would only bring immeasurable distress to the American masses, without benefit to the rest of humanity. The American standard of living for the worker is, indeed, a goal that ought to be kept before the rest of the world. The American protective policy will be made unnecessary when the rest of the world has brought its toiling masses up to the level now occupied by the American worker.

In this, as in all his other utterances, President Coolidge points out the essential unity of interest among all Americans. As President McKinley so often said: "In this country, we all go up or down together." Candidacies and campaigns based upon demands for class, group or occupational advantage are essentially un-American.

The people of this country will respond to these common sense appeals of President Coolidge, so thoroughly in harmony with the spirit of Americanism. The demagogues who seek to arouse class hatred, envy and prejudice are not dealing with European masses habituated to class consciousness, but with Americans trained to thinking of national problems in a national and a patriotic way. The common sense campaign of Coolidge and Dawes continues to gain strength, because it is in harmony with the common sense character of the American people.

It is time to call a halt.—Wynneville Enterprise.

We copy the above from the Enterprise, and commend it to the attention of the drivers of cars, and also to the drivers of cars, and also to the police officers of our Town. We have too much fast driving in Marion for the good of the pedestrian, and now that the schools have opened and our streets are often crowded with the passage of children going to and from the schools, the exercise of the greatest caution in driving cars is needed. Get the habit of driving slowly and carefully. It is only a short distance through the streets of the Town, and you cannot lose but a minute or two if you go slowly; and remember if in your speeding you should happen to strike and injure one of these little children that it would put a black place in the record of your life that you can never rub out and for which you would never forgive yourself.

BOOMING VIRGINIA

Richmond, Va.—As a result of men of Southwest Virginia are enthusiastically pledging their assistance to the Virginia State Chamber of Commerce in its great program of development for Virginia, according to word which has just been received from D. B. Ryland, secretary of the organization, now conducting a membership campaign in the Ninth Congressional District. So enthusiastic has been the welcome, that Mr. Ryland's campaign has been extended until September 12, ten days longer than at first announced.

Under the direction of Lee Long, of Dante and Bristol, vice-president of the State Chamber and president of the Clinchfield Coal Corporation, conference with the business interests of Bristol, Norton, Wise, Big Stone Gap, Dante, Grundy, Abingdon, Marion, Saltville and Pulaski have been arranged, and it is estimated that Mr. Ryland will talk before 90 percent of the business interests of the District before leaving the section.

The Ninth District has been especially interested in the work which has been done by Major LeRoy Hodges, managing director of the State Chamber, who this spring

visited the New England States and in a series of conferences arranged for the visit of a group of New England business men to Virginia this fall. When here they will visit Southwest Virginia and an effort will be made to influence them to trade with Virginia coal interests instead of buying from the Pennsylvania fields and importing their coal from England and Wales, which is being done extensively at the present time.

Mr. Long has been asked to draw up an itinerary for the New Englanders when they visit this State, and they will be shown the wonders of the Great Southwest section and the advantage of trading with Virginia.

Through the development of Hampton Roads, which is the first great goal of the State Chamber, it is hoped to double the sales of Virginia coal in the East and to compete successfully with British and Pennsylvania fields. Mr. Ryland has been quick to make business men of the Southwest realize this, and they are preparing to support the State Chamber to the fullest extent.





CRANK CASE OILS worst enemies


