

### Aaron Burr Mansion Soon to Be Razed.

New York, May 15.—Another New York landmark, the famous Aaron Burr mansion on Riverside drive, is to go before the advancing line of modern apartment houses, which are gradually covering up every available foot of ground in the upper part of the city. The mansion, one hundred and forty years old, has just been sold at auction to a builder, and will torn down at once. It stands on a plot about 100 feet square on a hill overlooking the Hudson. James Madison, President of the United States, occupied it from 1804 to 1806.

### Female College to Be Built at Marion, Va.

Architect Clarence B. Kearfoot, of this city, has just been awarded the contract for the plans and specifications for a building to be erected at Marion, Va., to be occupied by the Marion Female College.

Some months ago the trustees of the original Marion Female College, an important Lutheran college, decided to remove it from Marion to Salem, Va., where the large Lutheran Male College is located. Soon a movement was started at Marion for the establishment of a female college to take the place of the institution, which was removed, and it culminated a short time ago in the organization of the Marion Female College and the completion of financial arrangements for the erection of a main building to cost \$45,000.

Architect Kearfoot has begun his work on the plans and specifications. He has already made preliminary plans for the building, which will be one of the most modern of its kind in this entire section. As soon as the plans are completed they will be available for use of contractors who may desire to bid, and it is expected that work will be started on the handsome new structure within the next few weeks.—Bristol Herald Courier.

### Making a Will.

A man may have moved among his friends for many years with no question as to his sanity, but after death, when he has bequeathed his money in a way his relatives do not like it will suddenly be established in court that the testator was a lunatic, and did not have sense to know what he was doing. There used to be an old lawyer in Hartford, Conn., who said that he could break any will, no matter who it was made by or in what State, and the success which attended him in his practice emphasized the truth of his contention.

An effort was made not long ago in Massachusetts to provide for the probing of wills before death. It was proposed that a man upon making a will should go to the probate court and offer it for probate. Any objections to be made to the will were to be made then, after due notice, and if they were not sustained at the time no further contest of the will was to be permitted. It seems to us that this was a very good scheme and it might be followed in other States with benefit. Some people get around the difficulty of will-making by giving their money away before they die, keeping the usufruct in the meantime, but that is a very dangerous practice as Shakespeare so eloquently showed in King Lear. Our system of making wills, like our system of transferring real estate, is expensive, unsatisfactory and antiquated.—Charleston News and Courier.

### Madero Names Cabinet.

Provisional Government in Mexico An Established Fact.

Juarez, Mexico, May 13.—Mexico's provisional government, composed of insurrectionists, became an established fact several days ago with the naming of a cabinet by Francisco I. Madero, Jr., provisional president, and with the establishment of a capital in the captured city of Juarez, where General Navarro and his federal troops are held prisoners.

The cabinet follows: Minister of Foreign Relations, Dr. Vasquez Gomez; Finance, Gustavo A. Madero; War, Venustiano Carranza; Interior, F. Gonzales Garza; Justice, Jose M. Pino Suarez; Private Secretary to President Madero, Juan Sanchez A. Secona.

Secretary of War Carranza will have charge of railways and telegraphs, and his first act was to grant permission for the repair of the Mexico Northwestern railroad. Men immediately began repairing the road bed south of Juarez.

Gonzales Garza will have charge of the mail service, and Secretary of the Treasury Madero will direct the affairs of the custom house.

That the insurrecto army is more than an armed mob has been shown in the absence of general looting and intoxication and the quickness with which the shattered city was cleared of its dead and wounded. The embargo against visitors was removed during the day and sightseers in thousands poured across the bridges from El Paso.

### Unification of Methodists Matter of Years.

Chattanooga, Tenn., May 15.—That great progress has been made toward unification of Methodism, but that obstacles that may yet be difficult to overcome have presented themselves, is contained in the statement issued by commissioners of the three branches of the church who concluded a three-day session last week. These commissioners, nine from each branch, have decided upon a "series of suggestions" for the bringing of the different branches of the church under one head, but details of these "suggestions" will not be made public until submitted to the separate conferences. Even though these "suggestions" are adopted, it is said unification cannot be effected sooner than six years.

### Would Provide Home for Drunks.

Dr. J. C. King, superintendent of the Southwestern State hospital at Marion, said while in Richmond last week that he intended in his next annual report to renew and enlarge upon his recommendation that a special State institution for the care and cure of inebriates be established.

According to Dr. King alcoholism and the drug habits are merely forms of disease and should be treated as such. In discussing his proposed methods of cure Dr. King said:

"I would keep the inmates of such an institution fully occupied, for there should be work for all. Many of them have natural ability and can engage in pursuits of the institution which will make it self-supporting. I would pay them a fraction of what one would pay for the same labor outside, so that their families might have some income. However, this point is not vital, for the confirmed drunkard or drug user is of little advantage to his family at the best. Some of them have fair earning power and work between sprints, but fines and troubles generally make their absence a genuine benefit to the families until they can be cured.

"I do not know," said Dr. King, "if the State is ready for this, but I shall continue to preach it, for I believe the time will come when it will be realized."—Richmond News Leader.

### Good Outlook for Wheat.

The Government report on the winter wheat crop as of May 1st is encouraging, and ought to give heart to those pessimists who see nothing but disaster for the business future of the country. The condition of the crop is better than the average for the first or May during the last ten years, better than the condition on May 1st a year ago, and better also than the condition on April 1st of the present year. It is true that more damage has been done by adverse weather conditions during the winter and spring than was anticipated; this was estimated at a reduction of 2,000,000 acres in the total tract under cultivation and turns out to be 2,118,000 acres; yet even so it is figured that the final yield may be in excess of 500,000,000 bushels, and even if this record breaking aggregate is not reached, the best previous figures, 492,888,000 in 1906, may be equaled or approximated.

Wheat is not out most profitable crop. In 1909 the value of the harvest was \$730,049,000 against \$1,652,822,000, the value of the corn yield. Yet it is of sufficient importance to operate as a prime factor in the prosperity of the year. Industries may be depressed, business men may be waiting with anxiety the verdicts in the trust cases; but it is highly gratifying to find one of the largest sources of income in the country practically assured.—Providence Journal.

### Money for Good Roads.

Eighty Virginia Counties Will Get Aid From the State.

State Highway Commissioner P. St. Julien Wilson has announced the apportionment of the State good road fund among the Counties of Virginia, which appropriation will aggregate \$200,000 under the act of the last legislature. Seven counties have failed to make application for State aid in road-building this year. Thirteen counties have applied for convict labor in lieu of cash aid, and eighty counties will share in the distribution of cash. The following Ninth district counties will receive good road money from the State:

Bland, \$631.57; Dickenson, \$1,915.73; Giles, \$1,367.27; Grayson, \$1,390.17; Lee, \$2,463.39; Pulaski, \$2,495.87; Scott, \$1,880.42; Smyth, \$1,800; Tazewell, \$3,483.43; Wise, \$4,573.98; Wythe, \$4,122.30.

### War Secretary Resigns.

Washington, May 15.—Secretary of War Jacob McGavock Dickinson, of Tennessee, the Democratic member of president Taft's cabinet has resigned, and Henry L. Stimson, of New York, recently defeated Republican candidate for Governor of that State, has been given the war portfolio. This announcement was made at the White House last Friday and occasioned great surprise.

In the letters exchanged between the President and Mr. Dickinson no reason, other than that of pressing private affairs, is given for the Secretary's retirement. The President will confer with Mr. Stimson in New York, but the new Secretary of War will not be sworn in until the return of the President to the capital to-day. Mr. Dickinson will go to his Tennessee home immediately upon the qualification of his successor. He expects to devote his attention to business and will not return to the practice of law in which he was engaged when President Taft appointed him secretary of War in March, 1909. He is the second member of Mr. Taft's cabinet to retire to private life, Secretary of the Interior Ballinger having severed his connection with the President's official family only a few months ago.

### Bones of a Mammoth Are Found in Clay Pit.

The bones of a mammoth animal which roamed this section a thousand or more years ago, were found several days ago in the clay pits of Adams, Payne and Gleaves' brickyard, in the bottom, on the south side of Roanoke river between Jefferson street and Franklin road.

The bones were found in blue clay about six feet below the surface. The colored men were digging out clay when Steve Miller's pick struck what appeared to be a portion of a tree trunk. When it was gotten out it was seen that it was a portion of a thigh of an animal, which had been blackened by time, but was still well preserved.

Further digging brought out the balance of the thigh bone, the joint and half of a large tooth. The bone was forty six inches long and thirty inches in diameter. The half of tooth was six inches long. The socket bone which worked in the hip, is about the size of a large alley ball.

A search is being made for other bones and it is believed a goodly portion of the skeleton of the mammoth animal will be discovered.—Roanoke Evening World.

New Voters Still Have a Chance to Register.

Interest in the coming political campaign has aroused a good deal of inquiry among some of the new voters as to whether they can take a part in the elections this fall. The laws provide that when a new voter becomes of age before the regular November election he can vote, but he has to pay his poll taxes for the first year and get his name on the registration books. He can register at any time after paying his poll taxes up to thirty days before the election. If a voter reaches his majority the day preceding his election he is eligible for registration and can vote in the election this fall.

Want Reports of Typhoid

Richmond, May 17—With the announcement that every reported outbreak of typhoid fever during the coming summer will be investigated by experts from its headquarters, the State Department of Health has issued a statement calling upon physicians and the public generally to send prompt notice to the Department of all outbreaks of typhoid fever.

Virginia is Second.

Jacksonville, Fla., May 17—Significant were the words with which this city first recognized the presence in its midst of the advance guard of the Southern Baptist convention. "How lovely are the messengers that preach to us." A chorus of 75 sang the words, as the opening number of a concert in honor of the convention. Part of the evening program was a lecture by Dr. Stratton, of Baltimore. The collection went to Columbia College, at Lake City, whose president is Dr. H. W. Tribble, formerly of Virginia. In contributions Virginia comes second among the States, both for home and foreign missions. The total for foreign missions is \$510,000, and for home missions \$333,000. The delegates are arriving, and by tomorrow afternoon when the convention meets, probably 1,500 will be enrolled. A complete surprise was sprung at the opening of the Southern Baptist convention when Dr. E. C. Dargan, pastor of the First Baptist church of Macon, Ga., was placed in nomination for president against Joshua Levering, who had been proposed for re-election to that office. When the votes were counted it was found that Dr. Dargan had been elected.

Rath, who was fourteen years old when he started, has visited nearly every country in the world. Leaving St. Louis, he walked to Mexico, then to Honduras, Brazil, and then went to England. When he travels on ship-board he must walk twelve hours a day to fill his contract.

Rath will go to Boston in a few days and sail for London. One condition of his walk is that he must bring back a dog. He has already had three, and Jack, the present one, has already covered some thousands of miles.

Rath says he has worn out four hundred and thirty-three pairs of shoes in his long tramp. He must end his walk with \$1,000 in his possession. So far he has saved up \$40. If successful in his accomplishment he expects to receive \$30,000 from the St. Louis Club.—New York Times.



Live Issue in 1912.

It will be the duty of the General Assembly of 1911—that whose members are to be elected at the polls this November—to redistrict the State both for congressional and legislative representation.

This work, which is required by the Constitution, is a necessary sequel of the publication of the 1910 census figures as the population shifts greatly in the course of every decade.

It can readily be perceived by thinking people that the task prescribed for the State's lawmakers is no easy one. It presents some difficult problems, and everybody defers to the most unobtrusive and the most unobtrusive knows that it likewise involves a good deal of politics.

As the Commonwealth is now dominated by the Democrats, it is safe to assume that the members of the General Assembly who represent this party will take good pains, in their function of redistricting, to look well after the interests of their own political brethren.

But it is not going too far to predict that marked differences of opinion also will occur among Democrats and that the situation will have its elements of excitement before the matter is finally settled.

Already one hears various suggestions as to the Ninth Congressional District, which in recent years has come to be an impregnable Republican stronghold. Some think that the solons might so arrange things as to weaken the strength of the "enemy" in this district; others maintain that it is wiser to strengthen it for the Republicans by adding certain Republican counties now in the Fifth District and by lopping off certain Democratic counties which might serve a better purpose elsewhere.

The question, briefly put, is this: Is it the part of wisdom to abandon forever the Ninth District and make it irrevocably Republican simply to strengthen other districts now more or less doubtful?

By many it has been suggested that the counties of Carroll and Grayson, which are persistently Republican, should be taken from the Fifth District, where they have recently given the Democrats no little worry, and added to the Ninth District.

As a part of the same scheme it is further suggested that Giles and Pulaski, now Democratic counties, be chopped off the Ninth District and tacked on to the Sixth.

And last of all, it is maintained by some that Halifax and Charlotte, now in the Sixth District, should be transferred to the Fifth.

It can be seen at a glance by experienced politicians that the Fifth District would certainly profit by these changes—that is, viewing the matter from a democratic standpoint—but for all that, objections may arise.—Richmond Journal.
