Funds for P. O. Site Available July 1st.

In the act of the last session of the Sixty-first Congress making appropriations for sundry civil expenses in the fiscal year beginning July 1st, next, provisions were made for the expenditure of \$8,436,895 in the Southern States. The appropriations for localities in Virginia were as follows:

- Big Stone Gap, postoffice and court house, \$85,000.
- Franklin, postoffice, \$5,000.
- Hampton, postoffice, \$20,000.
- Lexington, postoffice, \$50,000.
- Pulaski, postoffice, \$5,000.
- South Boston, postoffice, \$5,000.
- Suffolk, postoffice, \$45,000.
- Warrenton, postoffice, \$12,000.
- Waynesboro, postoffice, \$5,000.
- Bedford City, postoffice, \$45,000.
- Covington, postoffice, \$45,000.
- Wytheville, postoffice, \$60,000.
- Richmond, postoffice, court house and custom-house, \$350,000.

The State Finances.

Mr. C. B. Garnett, Manager of the Democratic League, Talks on Subject.

Mr. Garnett said to day that the Virginia Democratic League would make, as one of the leading issues of the coming campaign, the plank of the platform relating to finances, and reading as follows:

"We favor economy in the administration of the affairs of the State and the strict imitation of appropriations to the revenues of the State."

Mr. Garnett said: "It is a well-known fact that the bonded indebtedness of the State of Virginia is greater in amount than that of any State except New York and Massachusetts includes both the direct debt for which the Commonwealth is responsible, and the contingent debt for which the Commonwealth has loaned its credit to sundry cities and towns. If from the total debt of Massachusetts, we subtract the contingent debt (that is, the debt for which the Commonwealth has loaned its credit to the cities and towns), and from the total direct debt of Massachusetts we subtract the sinking fund which has accumulated, Virginia has the greatest bonded debt of any State in the Union, with the exception of New York."

Taking the latest figures available for comparison, the amount of Virginia's debt, is, in round numbers, \$25,000,000, and that of New York is \$57,000,000; but as the assets of New York are \$9,821,000,000, and those of Virginia, only \$838,000,000, it is seen that, while New York's debt is not three times as great as Virginia's, the assets of New York are more than ten times the assets of Virginia, and in proportion to her assets, Virginia has the largest bonded debt of any State in the Union.

"In spite of this well known fact, the management of Virginia's finances from 1908 until the present time has been such as to startle any thinking man."

When Governor Swanson came into the executive chair, he found a surplus of about \$600,000. Notwithstanding an increased income and the surplus which he found in the treasury, when Governor Swanson left the gubernatorial chair, he left a deficit, and it was only by asking the corporations to advance their taxes that Virginia was enabled in 1909 to meet her current obligations.

In 1910, such was the stringency of our finances, that the State was obliged to borrow the sum of \$250,000 from the banks in Richmond and pay four per cent. therefor in order to meet her current obligations—an event unprecedented in our annals so far as I know. In September of 1910 the State was unable to pay \$150,000 in pensions, as had been invariably done during that month, and our old soldiers were forced to wait because there were no funds available; and it does not require much knowledge of our finances to predict that in the fall of 1911 the same conditions will force Virginia again to go to the banks on suppliant knees and ask a matter of favor that they will lend her money to meet her current obligations.

But this is not the worst of the story: For the year 1909 the State failed to comply with a law passed during Governor Swanson's administration, requiring that there should be paid into the sinking fund the sum of \$125,000 in order to meet her bonded indebtedness.

In spite of the sad experience of our readjuster days, in spite of the fact that Virginia is carrying the biggest load on her shoulders of any State in the Union, those who have been charged with the management of our finances have neglected to note the shoals which were charted so plainly that "he who runs may read." The credit of the old State is again threatened and our bonds are selling at panic prices.—Tuesday's Lynchburg News.

Bill to Tax Unmarried Women.

Madison, Wis., March 27.—A bill to tax \$5 annually every unmarried woman over twenty-five years old and to create a "matrimonial commission," consisting of the Governor, Superintendent of Public Property and Chief Clerk of the Assembly, has been introduced in the Assembly by Assemblyman Hansen, of Manitowoc, of "trouserette" fame.

The matrimonial commission is charged with the duty of bringing together kindred souls when application is made for an affinity by any love-lorn maiden.





Order for Election on Bond Issue.

VIRGINIA: At a Circuit Court continued and held for Smyth county, at the Court House thereof, on Tuesday, the 21st day of March, 1911:

This day came the Board of Supervisors of Smyth county, by their attorney, and presented a petition signed by the members of the said Board, praying the Court to enter an order requiring the Judges of the Election for Smyth county, to open a poll on the 2nd day of May, 1911, to take the sense of the qualified voters of said county, whether the Board of Supervisors of said county, shall issue bonds of Smyth county to an amount not exceeding \$250,000.00, said bonds to bear interest at the rate six per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually, on the 1st day of January and July of each year, and to run for a period of thirty years, from date when issued with the privilege of redeeming said bonds, or any of them, at any interest paying period after fifteen years from date of bonds, said bonds to be issued for the various Magisterial districts of said county, as follows:

- ST. CLAIR DISTRICT.**
- 1st. To permanently improve the public road beginning at the residence of Levi Cole, to a point on the White Top turnpike, distance about one mile.
 - 2nd. To re-locate, McAdamize and otherwise improve the public road beginning at the forks of the road near Martin Houston's residence to Baker's store on the North side of the river, distance about one mile.
 - 3rd. To re-locate, McAdamize and otherwise improve the public road from Baker's store to the public road near John Callihan's residence, distance about one mile.
 - 4th. To re-locate and permanently improve the public road from Dr. Young's place to the St. Clair Bottom church, distance about one-half mile.
 - 5th. To permanently improve the public road from the McAdam road near John Bishop's to a branch in the Old Blue Spring road, near the residence of Adam Miller, distance one-half mile.
 - 6th. To permanently improve the road from the iron bridge at Riverside to the forks of the road near H. F. Cole's, distance about one-half mile.
 - 7th. To re-locate and permanently improve the public road from E. S. Nell's residence to a point in the road leading to Marion, on Dr. McKee farm, distance about one-fourth mile.
 - 8th. To permanently improve the public road beginning at a point in the Marion road about 200 yards West of Daniel Blankenbecker's house, and extending East to the District line, distance about one and one-fourth miles.
 - 9th. To permanently improve the public road leading from Holstein Mills passing Henry Dutton's residence to a point in the Marion road at Talbert Elswick's, distance about one and one-fourth miles.

- 20th: Plaster Bank road to Lick

Creek at Joe Young's, one half mile.

It therefore ordered by the Judges of the election of the County of Smyth, that the County of Smyth, shall hold an election on the 2nd day of May, 1911, at polls, at the various voting places of the County of Smyth, including the polls at the voting places, incorporated towns located in the County, and take the sense of the qualified voters of the said County on the question whether the Board of Supervisors for said County should issue bonds for McAdamizing and otherwise permanently improving the said public roads heretofore mentioned, and if so, to issue said bonds to an amount not to exceed the sum of \$250,000.00, and if it be so ordered that the regular election of said county, at the time and place before designated shall conduct election and close the polls in the manner as is provided by law for elections and make returns as provided by statute, in the manner made and provided. A further order that the Board of Smyth county shall print and furnish the ballot for said election, as required by the Act of the General Assembly of Virginia, approved February 25, 1908, as amended by Act approved February 16th, 1910.

And in the event the question of issuing said bonds shall be decided for the issuing of the same said bonds are issued by the Board of Supervisors, it is further ordered that One Hundred and Dollars of said bonds shall have written or printed thereon the following sentence: "These bonds are issued for the Rich Valley Magisterial District, full faith and credit of the County is hereby pledged for payment and a tax to be levied on the property of said district the interest on them and to sinking fund sufficient in amount to pay them upon maturity One Hundred Thousand Dollars said bonds shall have written or printed in said bonds, the following sentence: "The bonds are issued for the Marion Magisterial District, full faith and credit of the County is hereby pledged for payment, and a tax to be levied on the property of said district and a sinking fund sufficient amount to pay them upon maturity and Fifty Thousand Dollars said bonds so issued shall have written or printed in said bonds, the following sentence: "These bonds are issued for St. Clair Magisterial District, but full faith and credit of the entire county is hereby pledged for their payment, and a tax to be levied upon the property of said district to pay the interest on said bonds and to create a sinking fund in amount to pay them upon maturity", and said bonds shall conform in all other respects to the requirements of an Act of the Assembly approved Feb. 25, 1908, as amended by Act of Assembly approved Feb. 25, 1908, pages 71 to 75 inclusive and 1910, pages 22 to 24 inclusive. It is further ordered that a copy of this order shall be published in the newspaper published in Smyth county, at the residence of the Sheriff at the office of the Court House of said County, and each voting place in the county, at least twenty days before the election.
