No Secrets in Registration Books.

The contest in the Second district between Maynard and Young for the nomination is disclosing an ugly chapter in the Democratic politics of the State. Both sides are fighting hard to cover up their tracks. It was alright for their partizan workers to copy the registration books, but now they don't want the attorneys for the people to see them. Here is what a leading Democratic paper says:

"If facts, which counsel for the people think will throw light on the methods of conducting the primary, are withheld on the ground that they will hurt the Democratic party or any other such flimsy plea the thinking people of the Second district and of Virginia will never believe other than what they believe now, namely: That there was fraud somewhere.

Counsel for the people should stubbornly insist upon knowing what the counsel for Maynard and Young do not wish them to know. Registration books are the property of the public and not of office holders or other individuals or even of parties. If the disclosure of everything in the books hurts the Democratic party, so be it. There should be no secrets in the registration books."

In this connection the following from the Norfolk Landmark is pertinent:

"Objection to the display of the registration books used in the recent Democratic Congressional primary is based by counsel for Mr. Young upon the theory that the notes on these books ought not to be given to the enemy, presumably the Republicans. This objection is entirely illogical. The registration books are public property, and no set of men has the right to claim exclusive privileges with regard to them. There ought not to be anything on them which is not ready for the scrutiny of the people, as a whole. We have had too much secrecy. Light is the best protection of the community and the best safe-guard of politics. Chairman McIntyre hit the nail on the head when he remarked that it is unfortunate if any private matter is on those records."

Scott Republicans O. K.

A Gray-Gilmer, a young lawyer, of this city, returned last Saturday from Scott county, which county he touched, making speeches in the interest of Mr. Slemm. He was accompanied by John H. Catron and Hop, H. C. L. Richmond. These gentlemen made a number of speeches, addressing large audiences at various points in the country. Everywhere they found the Republicans wide-awake to the situation and in earnest to make the majority in Scott a big one for the present Congressmen.

Mr. Gilmer states that he never experienced a more unanimous sentiment among the Republicans, and he is confident that Scott will give an unusually large Republican majority in November.—Bristol News.

Slemm Keenly Cuts Stuart.

The following are a few pointed remarks made by Congressman C. B. Slemm in his opening speech at Jonesville, in reference to the speech delivered by Hon. H. C. Stuart, when he opened his campaign in Gate City several weeks ago:

"From a careful reading of my opponent's opening speech in this campaign, I have come to the conclusion that he is going to try to crowd me off my tariff platform, but I'm going to stick to it. I was elected on it; I served in Congress on it; I am going to be elected again on it, and I am going to stand on it in spite of all my opponent may say or do."

"Oh, he can stand on it with me if he will do so. There is plenty of room for us both and for all other repentant Democrats, and I will welcome him; but I want him to stand on it as a Republican."

"I am a Protectionist."
"My opponent says his observations abroad taught him this. If so, I am in favor of sending all the Democratic Congressmen from Virginia on an observation trip to Europe right away."

"It is nice to see the light spread, even though it takes a trip abroad to spread it."

"I wonder what sort of an apology the Democrats are going to offer the people for the way they have denounced protection heretofore and attempted to fool the people—I wonder what kind of an excuse they are going to put up on Judgment day for all of the things they have said protection has done for the country?"

"It seems to me that their minds will be constantly reverting to a verse in that good old hymn that our mothers used to sing:

"And must I be to Judgment brought,
To answer in that day;
For every vain and idle thought,
For every word I say?"

"My friends, my distinguished opponent's conversion to the doctrine of protection has a parallel in the words of the old Roman governor to the apostle, St. Paul. After hearing the unsearchable truths of Christianity, which were explained to him by the great apostle, he exclaimed:

"Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian."

"Let us hope that in the case of my opponent that his conversion to Republicanism will be complete and that we will not have to quote another good hymn:

"Almost persuaded—but LOST."

The Democrats Vote Dead Men, &c.

The investigation of the primary recently held in the Second district is disclosing and uncovering some ugly facts and much fraud. Here is what the press dispatches, as taken from the Democratic press, says:

"Citizens' counsel, following hard work, declare that the further they go into the returns from Norfolk city, Norfolk county and Portsmouth city, 'the worse things get.' A message received by them said that R. L. Green, recorded as voting in the Hall's Corner precinct of Norfolk county, had been dead for eight years. This was followed very quickly by the receipt of word, they said, that Ernest H. Meeks, recorded as voting in the Court House precinct of Norfolk city, was in Boston on August 23rd, the day of the primary.

AWAY DAY OF PRIMARY.
Citizens' counsel, with a partial abulation of the Portsmouth returns, as copied from the poll books, declare that Rey. Dr. R. B. Garrett, pastor of the Court Street Baptist church, in that city, is recorded as having voted, whereas, Dr. Garrett was away on the day of the primary. Dr. Garrett's name appears on the list of the Portsmouth poll books, in the possession of citizens' counsel, No. 295 in the Second or Courthouse Ward of Portsmouth.

In the Portsmouth Court House precinct the citizens' counsel also charge that J. H. Toomer, Jr., recorded as voting, was in New York on election day, while Rev. Dr. Perryman, in the pulpit of the First Baptist church of Norfolk, called the name of W. C. Corbitt, who was in Europe on election day, as one of those who had been recorded along with Dr. Garrett as having voted; the name of Mr. Corbitt does not appear on the copy of the poll books in possession of citizens' counsel who, however, turning to the Fifth Ward of Portsmouth, where Mr. Maynard lives, point to the names of N. L. Dodson, dead. They say the work has just begun, and that other alleged frauds will also be brought out."

Voting dead men and voting men in New York, Boston and Europe is a bad sample of Democratic politics, especially under the new Constitution. This kind of thing was done in the Ninth district a few years ago, but the promise was that it should be no more. Now, if the Democrats have violated this sacred pledge and gone to defrauding each other, what may we expect here in the Ninth district, where the contest is against Republicans? If Democrats will defraud each other, will they do less to

their fellow men who are Republicans? Here in the Ninth district, where the Electoral Boards are all Democratic and wherever they refuse Republicans the right to name their Judge of Election it is prima facie proof that crooked work may be done. Mr. Stuart is claimed to be a high clean man. The Democrats have all the election machinery in their hands and have promised a fair election. We hope they will not follow in the footsteps of their party in the Second Congressional district.

Big Stone Gap, Va., Sept. 23.—Special—Public Resolution No. 42, passed at the last session of Congress and approved on June 25, 1910, is of general interest throughout this section, as well as in many parts of the South. The full text of this joint resolution is as follows:

"Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the time for filing claims under the provisions of the Act of February 27, 1902, and amendments thereto, for horses, saddles and bridles taken from Confederate soldiers in violation of terms of surrender and for the payment thereof, is extended for two years from the passage of this joint resolution, and all claims not presented within this time shall be barred forever."

Thousands of these claims which Confederate soldiers have against the Federal government for property taken from them after the Surrender at Appomattox have already been paid by the Government, but a great many more were not prepared and submitted to the War Department within the time limit prescribed by the original law authorizing the payment of such claims and making appropriation therefor. For this reason, Congressman Slemm interested himself actively on behalf of those old soldiers who are entitled to reimbursement for their losses, and worked constantly for an extension of the time to those who had not learned of the opportunity open to them in time to take advantage of it within the prescribed limit. Being himself the son of a gallant Confederate leader and a true and loyal Southerner, he persistently followed up this joint resolution after it was introduced, and did not stop until it had been carried through the successive steps, which all legislation must follow, and finally enacted into law.

There is less hesitation about nothing this "estate" proposition in the light of the fact that Swanson is soon to be in the Ninth to speak on behalf of Mr. Stuart, and there seems to be a well fixed conclusion in every mind that Swanson could not make a speech without bringing in personalities very extensively.

Big Stone Gap, Va., Sept. 24.—

Special—Mr. Stuart's statement, recently sent out from Pulaski, in answer to the suggestions from Republican sources that, in case of his possible election to Congress, he would serve only one term, and be engaged in the active canvass for the Governorship nomination well before the end of that term, wherein he is reported to have said in effect that "in case of his election he would not hand the office down" as part of his estate," was called to the attention of those in charge of Republican headquarters here to-day. Mr. Slemm is away on a speaking tour, but the following statement is given out here:

"Mr. Stuart's alleged reply to what is a perfectly fair and straightforward proposition must be characterized as the weakest and most childish piece of dodging that has ever been attempted in a campaign of the importance and the prominence that attaches to this one in the Ninth district. No man who reads his statement could resist a feeling of pity at its simply childish character, and most men could not easily resist a wave of scorn at the weak, silly character of such an answer to any question by one aspires to so high an office as that of Congressman.

"It is felt that every word of the foregoing is justly deserved. When those in charge of the Democratic campaign seek to answer a proposition that is advanced, they should certainly present a tangible and understandable statement, and not attempt silly evasions. The question is up to Mr. Stuart: Is he making this race for Congress simply at the behest of Boss Martin, and thus as a mere stepping stone to the Governorship? Attempted brilliance and estates and the like is no answer.

"Since Mr. Stuart is said to have brought up the matter of 'estate,' however, it might be suggested that he is due to explain the reasons why the people of his home county sent up a shout that fairly rent the heavens when Hon. J. F. Griffith, at Lebanon, on Sept. 6th, made the suggestion that after the death of his old and valued friend, Colonel Campbell Slemm, Col. Slemm's estate paid its debts at one hundred cents on the dollar. This statement evoked prolonged shouts and exclamations of understanding throughout the audience."



TO THE LUTHERAN PEOPLE IN MARION AND IN SOUTHWEST VA.

You know that thirty-seven years ago our Female College was established in Marion and at that time it was sufficient for the demands of education. What was sufficient forty years ago will not answer for today. For several years we have been contemplating enlarging the opportunities and increasing the advantages to meet the demands of education today.

To carry out this idea the Trustees appointed a committee to seek a location in the town, not elsewhere, which would be more suitable for modern buildings and greater equipment.

In this effort to make a greater College and to secure the support of our church in Virginia the Virginia Synod was asked to co-operate.

Some of our people down the Valley and East of the Blue Ridge think such a large institution, as this is proposed to be, should be nearer the center of the State and a committee, representing those sections, will be seen what the advantages are over Lynchburg, Roanoke, Salem, Christiansburg, Radford and towns farther east. Mind this now, we are not seeking another place but invited the church to unite with us here, but it wants to know if Marion is better than other towns for such an institution. How shall we show our interest? If that committee finds us indifferent and not moving the Lutheran church in the State will not likely force on us an institution we do not want.

Our church stands for education. Look at it. In the United States we have fifty-six Orphan Homes, twenty-six Theological Seminaries, nine Deaconess Homes, forty Hospitals, thirty-seven Homes for the Aged, eighty-eight Colleges, with two hundred and sixteen publications. Shall our church in Southwest Virginia give the impression that we do not stand for these things? No, let us be true to the spirit of our church and hold our College in Marion. A College town has an air of culture and refinement about it—it is an educating power, and is worth very much to every one. We have only about ten days to do something. Slemp and McKinley Addressed a Fine Audience Last Thursday.

An excellent crowd gathered in the Court House at this place last Thursday night to hear Congressman Slemp and Hon. Duncan McKinley, of California.
