

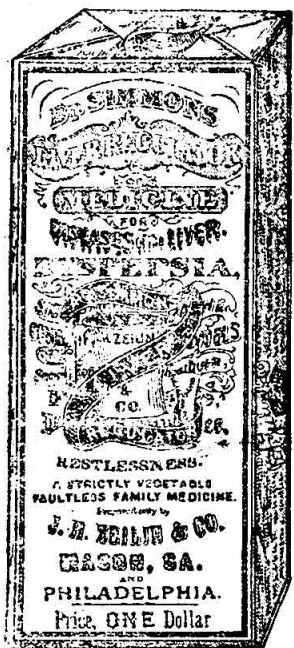

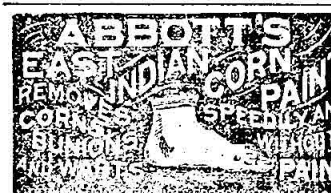

## Commissioner Raum's Report.

The annual report of Commissioner Raum of the Pension Bureau was submitted to the Secretary of the Interior on the 24th ult., shows that there are 676,160 pensioners—138,216 more than on the last fiscal year. The classification was as follows. Widows and daughters of Revolutionary soldiers, 23; army invalid pensioners, 413,597; army widows, minor children, etc., 108,537; navy invalid pensioners, 5,449; navy widows, minor children, etc., 2,568; survivors of the war of 1812, 7,590; survivors of the Mexican war, 16,379; widows of soldiers of the Mexican war, 6,976.

During the last fiscal year first payments were made upon 131,160 original claims, requiring \$31,395,539 for their payment. This is an increase in the number of original payments over the year 1890 of 64,532. The aggregate cost, however, was \$1,037,302 less.

The aggregate annual value of the 655,160 pensions on the roll June 31, 1891, was \$89,247,000, and the average annual value of each pension was \$139.99, and the average annual value of each pension under the act of June 27, 1890, was \$121.50.

The total amount disbursed on account of pensions, expenses, etc., during the fiscal year was \$18,548,959.71, as compared \$106,493,890.19, disbursed during the preceding year. So that it appears that 138,216 pensions were added to the rolls during the fiscal year just closed, at an increased cost to the nation of \$12,055,069, as compared with the expenditures for the previous fiscal year, and said expenditure includes \$4,357,347 paid upon vouchers remaining unpaid at the close of the year.

## Tin! Tin! American Tin!

An Industry Sure to Flourish.

A Welsh Manufacturer Says that Mills in Wales are Running on Half-Time—Americans Have all the Requisites.

E. G. Edwards, a son of Daniel Edwards, the largest individual tin-plate manufacturer in Wales, was at the Lafayette last night, says the Philadelphia Press. In speaking of the effect of the McKinley bill on the old Welsh and the new American tin-plate industry, Mr. Edwards candidly admitted that he could not help but see that the American manufacturers are bound to make the industry a go.

As a rule the Welsh manufacturers do not take this view, because, Mr. Edwards says, they do not want to anticipate such a state of affairs, and consequently shut their eyes to the contemplation of American manufacturers securing a market, which has heretofore taken 90 per cent. of the Welsh manufacture. In Wales there are one hundred tin plate manufacturers, Mr. Edwards said, employing probably 50,000 hands. These manufacturers produced last year about 10,000,000 boxes of tin plate. Of this output about 90 per cent, was exported to the American market.

Since the McKinley bill went into effect the Welsh mills have been running on half time, and instead of 90 per cent, being sent to America much of it is being warehoused, probably to meet an expected demand when the overstock sent in before the McKinley bill went into effect becomes exhausted. That the American manufacturers will not be able to compete with or interfere much with the Welsh output for this country is the hope of the Welsh manufacturers, but both Mr. Edwards and his father are keenly alive to the fact that such hopes are liable before long to be shattered.

"While the tin plate industry in Wales is over a hundred years old," said Mr. Edwards, "it is really only during the past thirty years that it has developed to such large proportions. The cause of this development is, candidly speaking, the American market, and when we are deprived of the American market, I must confess that I don't know what the Welsh manufacturers are going to do. That the American manufacturers are getting in good shape cannot be denied, and I do not think it is a difficult task for the American manufacturers to be able before long to meet the demand of the American market."

"There are many old tin plate workers now employed in iron sheet mills in this country who are simply waiting for a chance to resume their old trade in an American tin plate mill. Then, of course, there are many Welsh workmen who are willing to come over here, as the American manufacturers are offering skilled workmen just double the money they receive in the Welsh factories."

"Of course, should the American manufacturer shut the Welsh article out of the American market, unless another market is found to take its place, the Welsh workman and the Welsh manufacturer, too, for that matter, will have to look around him, and perhaps come to America."

This was liable, Mr. Edwards thought, to induce a number of the younger men in the tin plate industry to locate plants in this country. At present there are only about fifteen tin plate plants in this country, but Mr. Edwards can see no reason why there will not before long be almost as large an industry here as in Wales now.

"Your American manufacturers," said he, "have every requisite for success. You're mining tin, you are making your own steel plates and iron sheets, and you have lots of cash, and cash will get you all the help you want."

## VIRGINIA ITEMS.

Hog cholera is prevalent in Orange and Pittsylvania counties.

There is a man in Washington county who is 99 years old and has raised 32 children.

Farmer M. I. F. Wilson, living near Fredericksburg, exhibits a corn stalk with six perfect ears of corn.

A large number of German farmers hailing from Penn., located in Rockbridge county last week.

A new town will be started in W. Va. at the junction of the C. & O. and Camden Railroads. A company has been formed to develop it.

The coal used by the steamship Teutonic in her recent passage, in which she beat the eastward record, was from the Pocahontas mines in Tazewell county.

At Bedford City, Monday, a young man was fined \$20 for writing an obscene poem addressed to the factory girls of the town. He gave bail and properly departed from the city.

The sales of leaf tobacco in Danville for the year ended September 30 aggregated 40,990,000 pounds, an increase of more than 15,000,000 pounds over the sales for the previous year.

The Baptist congregation of Staunton have extended a call to Rev. J. R. Harrison, of Glade Spring. Mr. Harrison is looked upon as one of the foremost preachers in the Baptist church in Virginia.

J. G. Hylton, of Evington, Dickenson county, was arrested, charged with an attempted to smother Jesse Lee, whom he had enticed into a barn. He begged the sheriff to remove the handcuffs, which he did, whereupon he promptly made his escape.

Sheriff Byer, of Alleghany county, while visiting the Lynchburg jail Saturday, recognized Jack Prince, a negro confined there for shooting Norfolk & Western Conductor Gallo-way at Rural Retreat, the perpetrator of another murder committed in Alleghany. Prince had been charged with the latter charge.

Dr. John A. P. Baker, who is in jail at Abingdon under sentence of death for the murder of his wife, is cheerful and in good spirits. He is sentenced to be hanged Nov. 27, but his counsel have appealed to the circuit court for a new trial. The doomed man, it is stated, has several times invited to be present at the execution friends who are in the habit of visiting him in his cell. He hopes, however, that he may get a new trial and escape his doom.

## Washington Notes.

WASHINGTON, October 3.—Attorney General Miller today appointed W. D. Franzee assistant United States district attorney for Mississippi vice Montgomery, resigned.

The comptroller of the currency has today appointed Mr. H. W. Wolcott receiver of the Rio Grande National bank of Laredo, Texas.

A meeting called to take action on the death of Hon. Harvey M. Watterson, of Louisville, Ky., father of Henry Watterson, was held tonight at the Ebbitt House. It was attended by about 60 persons, mostly Kentuckians. Justice Lamar, of the United States supreme court, presided, and feeling speeches were made by Senator Carlisle, ex-Congressman Phil Thompson, ex-Governor McCreary, Judge Noah, J. B. Wright and H. Baber. Colonel Richard Wintersmith introduced appropriate resolutions which were adopted.

NO BLAINE CONFERENCE.

What Senator Hale Says About  
the Maine Man and the Presiden-  
cy.

PORTLAND, ME., Oct. 4.—Senator  
Hale denies the report that a confer-  
ence was recently held between him-  
self Senator Frye, and others in re-  
gard to Mr. Blaine's nomination for  
President. There has been no confer-  
ence, the Senator says, and no at-  
tempt at one. He had not met Sen-  
ator Frye for six months, and Mr. Man-  
ley had never declared to anybody  
that Mr. Blaine was a Presidential  
candidate.

"Mr. Blaine is not a candidate in  
any sense of the word," continued  
Mr. Hale, "and has done or said nothing  
to give rise to such a report on the  
authority of anybody. Mr. Blaine  
has been a very sick man, and has  
given his whole attention during the  
past summer to regaining his health.  
No political ambition has interfered  
with this. He is very much improv-  
ed, as his visit to me the past week  
shows. He has gone from Bar Har-  
bor to the greater quiet of Augusta  
with the same single aim of getting  
well."

Mr. Hale said that Mr. Blaine would  
stay at Augusta during October and  
perhaps longer. He would not hasten  
back to Washington. He would  
stay as long as he could in Augusta,  
where the complete quiet would be  
most beneficial to him.

"But if his health becomes perfect-  
ly well established, and his party de-  
mands him, he might become a can-  
didate?"

"But," continued Mr. Hale, "he is  
not a candidate. He asks for nothing,  
and wants nothing.

To this question Mr. Hale merely  
replied that if the saving of his party  
depended upon him it was possible  
that Mr. Blaine might become a can-  
didate, but, with so strong a man as  
Mr. Harrison to be had, such a con-  
dition was not likely to occur. The  
whole Blaine family, he said, had  
adopted a policy of silence and re-  
serve that ought to have convinced  
the public they were not soliciting  
favors.

**Tickets Now Ready for 1891 Tax**

TO THE PEOPLE OF SWITH COUNTY:  
In assuming the duties and responsibilities of the office of Treasurer of your county, I will reiterate my former promise of a fair and faithful performance of the duties of said office. I will endeavor to the best of my ability to meet the requirements of the office, extending all the courtesy and privileges that are in my power to give, but extending special favors to none, as it is not in my power to grant them. I will conform to the law in closing up the business of each year promptly; no ticket carried over. After the first of December of each year I put out for collection, all taxes remaining unpaid, adding the 5 per cent. penalty, which does not go into the pocket of the Treasurer, but is added to the revenue of your State and county. All tickets remaining unpaid the 1st of December will be put into the hands of responsible Deputies with instructions to collect, which they have to begin at once so as to meet the requirements of the law (see Sec. 603 of the code).

Now in view of the policy outlined, would urge the people to pay their taxes before the 1st of December, of each year and save the big interest of five cents on the dollar for an average of two or three months. All claims presented for payment whether transferred or otherwise, will first have all taxes deducted against the person for whom the claim was originally drawn. My office will be open every day from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m. until Dec. 1st, except following days specified below, on which I will attend the following places to receive the taxes and levies for the year 1891:
