Alfalfa Grown in Smyth County.

Richmond, Va., October 9.—The growth of the alfalfa industry in this State is significant, according to Commissioner Koiner, of the department of agriculture. He was very much impressed at the Powhatan county fair last week with the display of this product.

In Smyth county, at the recent fair, Mr. Koiner found that the product had been grown successfully, although it has been supposed that high altitudes were not adapted for its cultivation.

Indict Richmond Papers.

Richmond, Va., Oct. 9.—Indictments charging the publication and mailing of improper matter in connection with the Beattie murder case were returned here several days ago against the Richmond Evening Journal and the Richmond News Leader, afternoon newspapers, by the grand jury in the United States Circuit court. The cases are based on an interview with Beulah Binford which appeared in the News Leader while the girl was held in jail as a witness, and the publication by the Evening Journal of certain parts of the evidence given during the trial at Chesterfield. Postoffice Inspector Saffel was the principal witness against the papers.

Prohibition in Virginia.

Nashville, Tenn., Oct. 10.—The committee on temperance and morals of the Holston Conference Methodist Episcopal Church, South, which is now in session at Morristown, Tenn., yesterday reported a censorship of moving picture shows was advocated. The Anti-Saloon League was indorsed in its approval for a vote on State-wide prohibition in Virginia. Newspaper publication of liquor advertisements was deplored. Attention of the preachers was called to the divorce evil as well as to hasty and improper marriages. The Tennessee Anti-Saloon League was endorsed, the conference membership pledged to the maintenance of the present State-wide law and to the enactment of such laws in Virginia and West Virginia. The successful fight in the recent Tennessee legislature to save the prohibition laws was commended.

Richmond, Va., Oct. 9.—From Southwest Virginia comes a letter from Henry C. Stuart, of Russell, in which he says that he is in the race for the gubernatorial nomination, though he is not at this time engaging in making a campaign. This is the first direct and positive announcement in connection with the Governorship, and there is a good deal of speculation as to who will be in the race other than Mr. Stuart. It is known that Harry St. George Tucker has a hankering for the honor and it is reasonably certain that J. Taylor Ellison will not sidestep the honor if it comes towards him. In the absence of formal candidacy, however, the politicians are guessing and wondering who will come into the game and make it interesting. It is a long time to the entries, and there is no telling what will happen or who will be in the race.

A Dating Horseman.

"The day before General Lee surrendered," said a Confederate officer, "I crossed Sailor's creek, a small stream in Prince Edward county, Va., which follows the track of the Richmond and Danville railroad and empties into the Appomattox river. There was only a handful of my company left, and as I reached the summit of the hill which skirts its Eastern bank I turned to see if the Federals—who had been hotly pursuing us—were in view. As I did so I observed a man wearing the uniform of a Confederate officer ride slowly along the precipitous side of the stream opposite us, and evidently searching for a crossing.

"At this moment a long steel tipped blue line of Federal infantry crowned the hill above, in full view and within easy range of the horseman. Apparently abandoning all hope of escape, the latter turned and rode directly toward the enemy's line. As we watched him, breathless with anxiety lest the signal of surrender should be too long delayed, he suddenly wheeled about, put spurs to his horse, and dashing down the declivity cleared the stream with a bound. Not a shot was fired at the bold rider. As he reached the opposite bank a spontaneous shout went up from the whole line—a generous tribute from the brave to the brave. A moment afterward the Confederate was in the midst of us and we recognized in him General James A. Walker, the commander of the old Stonewall brigade."

Rice, the aged mayor of Bristol, Va., when he appeared before Acting Police Justice Dishner last Saturday morning on a charge of having assaulted Attorney Alfred H. Blanchard with a cane Friday, adding, "And I want you to fine me, please sir." The magistrate replied, "I will place a fine of \$1 upon you."

Mayor Rice was summoned to the court by Policeman Jas. Dearmond. The affair of last Friday, in which he used his cane vigorously, has been a source of much comment, owing to the fact that the mayor displayed such gameness at the age of nearly eighty years.

Attorney Blanchard, apparently, takes the trouble good naturedly. He says the mayor misunderstood him, and that he is his friend and would not have offered resistance out of respect for age.

Will Investigate the Penitentiary.

Richmond, Va., Oct. 9.—Governor Mann announced last week that he would transmit to the next General Assembly the request of the directors of the State penitentiary for an investigation of that institution and its management. This grows out of the bitter fight for the position of surgeon to the institution and the criticism which has been aimed at the board. There is no telling just what an investigation might do.

Swanson's Expenses.

Richmond, Va., Oct. 9.—United States Senator Swanson assuredly was not stingy with his money when he sought the nomination which came to him as a result of the primary of September 27th.

It cost him \$12,958.54 to defeat Congressman Glass. Senator Martin spent \$10,953, and Congressman Glass invested \$9,374.88 in his political venture.

Senator Swanson, like all the others figuring in the Senatorial contest, paid a \$3,000 assessment fee to the State committee. In addition to this, he also met a second assessment to help defray the expenses of the primary in Russell county. This cost him \$37.50. Senator Martin also gave up a like sum for the same purpose. Mr. Glass' account does not indicate whether or not he assisted the Russell Democrats.

A great deal of Mr. Swanson's money went for advertising purposes. Newspapers and printing concerns alike profited by his activities. He paid \$1,650 to the Barrett Printing Co. for pamphlets, while other publishers and printers got lesser sums, ranging from \$10 to \$500. Mr. Swanson paid out \$800 for clerk hire in Washington and \$336 for clerk hire in Richmond.

Electric Chair No Terror for Beattie.

"I'll show them how a man should die if that's what they're waiting for."
"The electric chair? Bah! What's that? Nothing, I tell you."
"If the lever on the switchboard is near enough to me I'll turn on the current myself."
"When a man's got to die let him do it like a man, without a whimper."
"But there's the Supreme Court. It's still got to act on this case before everything is over."
"I suppose some people are glad that I'm in this fix."
Thus does Henry Clay Beattie, Jr., the convicted wife murderer, voice his defiance of the grim pronouncement that he shall die in the electric chair November 24th, according to a friend who visited him in his cell at the city jail.
When seen Monday this man said he had conversed with Beattie several times since the trial was concluded. "Henry," said this friend, "exhibits no sign of fear over what the future holds in store for him. Beattie seems in better condition than at any time since his incarceration following the slaying of his wife in Midlothian turnpike on the night of July 18th. He has a good appetite for the meals that are taken him every day from his father's home in South Richmond, and his sleep is regular and unbroken. The mental attitude of the twenty six year-old husband, whom a jury of twelve Chesterfield county farmers declared was an uxoricide, is entirely at variance with the supposition that he will sign a confession before expiating his crime. "Beattie isn't going to confess," asserted a man who has seen him frequently. "He isn't that kind. When he rode home with his wife's dead body in the automobile he said a bearded highwayman killed her, and to his dying day he will not deviate one iota from that statement."

Samuels Indicted for Slaying His Son.

Richmond, Va., Oct. 11.—Theodore A. (Cyclone) Samuels has been indicted by a Henrico grand jury for the slaying of his son, John H. Samuels, on the evening of September 29th, when after a heated quarrel in the barn of the Samuels' home on Osborne turpikie.
The grand jury which indicted Samuels took the view that did not believe the killing was premeditated and informed the State's attorney that they would return an indictment for second degree murder. It is probable that the constable will never be brought to trial for the murder of his son. His counsel will ask the court to appoint a commission of lunacy to ascertain the mental condition of the father, which they say is unsound, and to have him sent to the asylum for the criminal insane at Marion, or confined in the Eastern State hospital at Williamsburg.

It will be of interest to Virginia's educational world and the reading public generally to know that during a recent meeting of the trustees of the Radford Normal, Dr. John Preston McConnell was elected president of the New Woman's Normal and Industrial School to be erected this year in the City of Radford. It is with great reluctance that Dr. McConnell severs his connection with Emory and Henry College, where he has occupied the chair of History and Political Science so faithfully and pleasantly for seven years. But the new honor conferred upon him opens up wider fields and he has agreed to accept.

Dr. McConnell originally hailed from the hills of Scott county, Va.; is of the "First-settler" Scotch-Irish stock, his ancestors having left the "Emerald Isle" and "Banks of Bonnie Doom" more than a century ago. His family connection is of the best; many of his relatives being leaders in the South's industrial, pastoral and professional pursuits. Leaving his position in Milligan College, he entered the University of Virginia, there winning a Ph. D. degree, together with an enviable record for excellent work under the well known educators, Col. Wm. E. Petrus, Dr. R. H. Dabney and Dr. Chas. W. Kent.

With the close of his University course he entered Emory and Henry in 1904 as Professor of History and Political Science. His thorough training, previous experience, native ability and tireless energy has made his work at Emory successful indeed.
