

**2 Police in Deadly Duel.**  
Pennington Gap, Va., May 8.—George Hinkle, chief of police of this village, and William Short, a patrolman of the St. Charles, Va., police force, are dead as the result of a pistol duel fought here last week. Hinkle attempted to arrest Short, who was alleged to have been disorderly during a circus performance. In the altercation that followed both officers drew revolvers and began firing. The aim of each man was perfect and both fell dead instantly.

Elyria, Ohio, May 8.—Instead of serving wine to guests at the weddings of her daughters, Mrs. J. J. Buswell, of this city, substitutes preserved peaches. Whenever the stork left a girl at the Buswell home, Mrs. Buswell preserved a can of peaches in honor of the occasion, the name of the child with the date of the fruit was sealed, being on the jar. Last week Miss Grace Marion Buswell became the bride of John E. Kusinski, of Berea, and the mother served the twenty-one-year-old peaches to the wedding guests. There are three other jars stored in the Buswell home for future brides.

### Georgia Peach Crop Reported Killed.

General Superintendent George R. Loyall, of the Western system of the Southern Railway, when asked as to the prospects for the Georgia peach crop, said he had been advised that it was practically wiped out, and that movement of peaches this season would be a very inconsiderable amount of the Southern's traffic. Last year the Southern moved 7,000 car-loads of peaches north and east from Georgia. This year it will probably not move 500 cars.

### To Unite Methodists.

Chattanooga, Tenn., May 9.—Beginning yesterday and continuing to May 12th, the joint commission representing three branches of Methodism will meet here to consider important questions. Under different names there are nineteen separate denominations of Methodism in America, and the total membership is nearly seven million. The twenty-seven commissioners will meet here next week represent about six million Methodists. They were appointed by the Methodist Protestant Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the M. E. Church, to consider the question of unification through re-organization.

### 5 Children Burn to Death.

Charlottesville, Va., May 9.—Sanford Davis, a farmer living near Free Union, Albemarle county, lost five of his six children in a fire, which destroyed his home yesterday. Davis, with his wife and an infant barely escaped in their night clothes. The dead children ranged in age from three to fifteen years. The family slept on the second floor, which was reached by a single stairway. The fire originated at the head of the stairs, cutting off all escape. The father attempted to reach the room, where the children slept, through a lone window, but on reaching the top of the ladder found the glass had already melted from the heat.

Calling to the children to come to him, the eldest child, Estelle, aged fifteen, cried out: "Papa, I can't get out, I am nearly strangled to death."

### Big Hail Stones Hold for a Week.

Clarksville, Tenn., May 8.—Mr. and Mrs. Joseph J. Smith, of Route No. 3, near St. Bethlehem, brought a curiosity sure enough to this city several days ago—a box of hail left over from last week's storm that swept over their farm. The hail must have been of extremely large size, for after five days of May weather the pieces were still as large as a walnut. There was a great quantity of it on the ground. Mrs. Smith had been using the hail for freezing cream. The pelting hail came with such force that all small trees and bushes had the bark literally chipped off, and older trees had the bark riddled by the hail stones. A fine orchard was almost entirely destroyed.

### First Big Aviation Meet in Bristol.

The Bristol Board of Trade has arranged to hold the first big aviation meet in the history of this entire territory, indeed, it will be the first opportunity that thousands of people of Southwest Virginia and East Tennessee will have had to see these birdmen in their startling mid air performances. This science has been so developed within the last eighteen months that experienced aviators are able to navigate under weather conditions that two years ago were not possible, and the flyers that have been secured by the Bristol Board of Trade are known to be among the most daring and successful of the day.

The dates on which flights are to be made are May 18th, 19th and 20th, at an hour in the afternoon that will give ample time for those arriving as late as 1:30 p. m. to reach the grounds before the maneuvering starts.

The several railroads operating into Bristol have put on a rate of one and a third fare for the round trip, with the exception of the Norfolk & Western, which has advertised a rate of one and three-fifths for the round trip, and are making provisions for extra equipment to handle the thousands of people who will come into Bristol during the three days of meet. J. S. Berger, the manager of the aviators who will be in Bristol, became famous in the geological world by giving to science Muissant and Claude Graham White and other noted men.

If you can't send me up for life, you'll be playing safe if you will make it ninety years at hard labor. All my people live to be over 100 years old and you had better make the sentence long enough." "You are only charged with being drunk," said the recorder, "and the heaviest sentence I can give you for that is ninety days. ### Joseph G. Cannon's 75th Birthday.

Joseph G. Cannon, representative of the Eighteenth Illinois district and former Speaker of the National House of Representatives, was born in Guilford, N. C., May 7, 1836, but at an early age moved with his parents to Indiana. He began life as clerk in a grocery store. He studied law in Cincinnati and was admitted to the bar in 1858. He settled at Tuscola, Ill., soon after and was elected State's attorney there in 1861, serving till 1868. In 1875 he moved to Danville, and about the same time was elected to Congress on the Republican ticket. With the exception of one term he has served in Congress continuously since 1873. Mr. Cannon was elected speaker in 1903 and occupied that position until the beginning of the present Congress, establishing a new record for length of service in the speaker's chair.

The biggest problem in some gardens is to get something to grow in shaded places, such as under trees. Grass will not grow under the dense shade of a Norway maple, or under many other trees having a less dense crown, when they are on the north side of the building. One of the best plants for such situations is Lily-of-the-valley, which will succeed even under oak trees—a position in which many plants seem to fail. **Scores Political Condition in Virginia.**

Very near the close of his speech last Friday night at the Academy of Music in Richmond Congressman Jones, who is candidate for United States Senate, said:

"I am willing to meet Senator Martin on any platform in any city or town or hamlet in Virginia and discuss these things with him.

"I charge that political conditions in Virginia have become so absolute-ly rotten that they are a stench in the nostrils of every honest man. I charge that honest men who have business before the Legislature of Virginia are held up by machine lobbyist when they are here and made to pay money to get their bills through the Legislature or they are defeated.

"I charge that a Democratic representative of the city of Richmond, at the last Legislature, introduced a bill which affected one of the greatest and one of the most beneficial interests in this Commonwealth.

"I charge that when he was asked by two of his brother members why he introduced such a bill, he said that he did it to help a certain distinguished machine politician and lobbyist, who had written the bill and asked him to introduce it in order that the lobbyist might go to the people whose interests were affected and get employment as a lobbyist to defeat it."

**Diaz Yields to Demand and Will Resign.**

Mexico City, May 9.—General Porfirio Diaz last night issued a manifesto to the people of Mexico declaring his intention to resign the presidency as soon as peace is restored. In this manner the President has virtually acceded to the demands of Francisco I. Madero that he make announcement of such intention.

As to when peace is actually restored, General Diaz reserves the right to be the judge. In the words of the manifesto it will be "when, according to the dictates of my conscience, I am sure that my resignation will not be followed by anarchy."

**Engraved a Portrait on an Old Saw Blade.**

In the May McClure's the present instalment of "Detective Burns' Great Cases" deals with Charley Ulrich, one of the world's greatest counterfeiters. Burns tells the following story of his cleverness at engraving:

Ulrich was tried, and sent to the penitentiary in Columbus, Ohio, for fifteen years. He was a model prisoner, and he was allowed to have a little shop in the prison yard. One day he picked up an old circular saw blade in the yard, and engraved on it a portrait of William Allen, who was at that time the Democratic candidate for Governor. It was one of the most perfect portraits ever engraved.

"When Ulrich had been in prison for seven years, President Hayes pardoned him through the intervention of the warden, Colonel Innis, who thought it a shame that such a clever artist should be shut up. Innis then set him up in an engraving shop in Columbus.

"I was a boy living in Columbus then, and used to watch him go up and down the street, for I'd heard his history and it fascinated me. At times I used to go over to see him, and I little dreamed then how much I was to see him later."
